HALIFAX DUPED.—A Londoner who has been in Halifax for some time past, enjoying the pleasures of the Halifax club, bonding many properties, and misleading mine owners has turned out to be an ex-convict. This news comes to Halifax from London. His professed name was Frank Carruthers his right name is Nash, under which he was arrested by detectives in London. While in Halifax he played his game cleverly, using the club in the furtherance of his scheme. He bonded properties to the value of \$1,000,000. One Haligonian is out \$3,000 and another \$400. While in Halifax he did not live low, but at a big Hollis street hotel. He was to marry the daughter of a prominent Londoner, on whom he claimed to have placed £50,000. He has been in his way one of the shapest confidence game men. This man was indicted under the name of Nash at the central court, London, for obtaining money under false pretences, and was convicted and sentenced. The affair is creating a breeze in Halifax.
