**Minister Experiments With Jazz, Religion**

LOUISVILLE, KY. (AP) — The trumpet man blows it hot and wild. The piano and bass pick up the beat. When the music stops, a man stands up to read "beat" poetry.

But the man is a minister. Those who listen are seated in Pews, not at candlelit tables. The scene is Jazz and Religion, an experimental vesper service at Louisville's First Unitarian Church.

The reader of poetry and moving spirit in organizing this jazz service was William David Brown, a bespectacled, energetic young man with red hair who is quick to tell you he thinks jazz is entirely appropriate in a 1964 church service.

Mr. Brown (he declines the title of reverend) said: "Jazz

The vesper service, tried here for the first time this spring, had as its theme The Triumph and Mystery of Man. Triumph here, the Unitarian pastor said, indicated a man's cumulative achievements and the continuation of the species.

He added that such dedication of a worship service to man was entirely consistent with Unitarian philosophy. Unitarians, he said, "believe in the worth and dignity of man and have never accepted his debasement."

The music for the service was provided by Don Murray and the Louisville Jazz Lab, a group of 21 young musicians, many of them students. Murray, a pianist who also composes classical music, wrote many of the jazz pieces especially for the service.

**Famous Church Reconsecrated**

LONDON (Reuters)—St. Mary in Bow, the church that houses the bells whose peals determine who is a Cockney, has been reconsecrated by Dr. Robert Stopford, Anglican bishop of London.

The church was destroyed in a Nazi raid in 1941. The 12 bells were restored in 1961. Legend has it that a Cockney by definition is anyone born within hearing distance of them.

The centuries-old church in the heart of the city has been restored structurally to the exact design of its architect, Sir Christopher Wren, the architectural genius who designed London's St. Paul's Cathedral.

Cost of the reconstruction which took eight years to complete was £2,600,000 (\$1,200,000).

Among the guests in the church Thursday were the Queen Mother and the Canadian High Commissioner Lionel Chevier.

**COAL MINERS RESCUED**

TOKYO (Reuters)—Eight coal miners were rescued alive Friday after being trapped by a cave-in at a pit near Naisawa, northern Japan, but two of them died later. The bodies of five other men were found in the pit.

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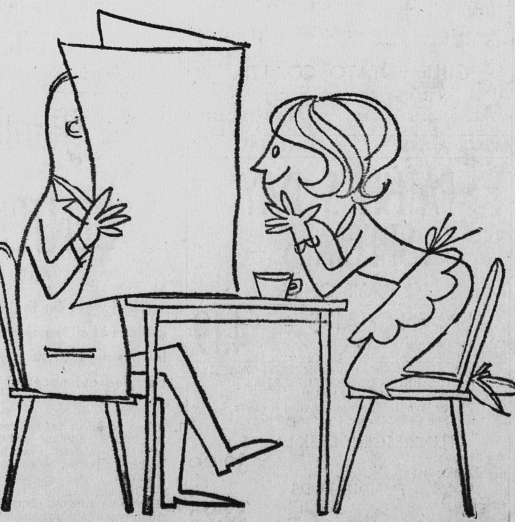
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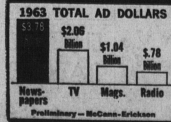
