Editorial Notes.

The friends of Sir Leonard Tilley will be glad to learn that he is making excellent progress towards convalescence.

Prof. J. C. Arthur, of New York, has been making a series of experiments which have led him to the belief that pear blight and other diseases of fruit trees is due, like the cholera and other epidemics in the animal kingdom, to the presence of living germs.

Mr. Ross Winans is an American millionaire, whose wealth has purchased for him an estate in the Scottish Highlands, and the delightful power of playing the tyrant in the character of a laird over the people in his vicinity.

By notice in another column, a Convention of Liberal-Conservative delegates is called to meet in Scott's Hall, Charlottetown, on Wednesday the 4th day of November next, at 12 o'clock noon, to nominate a candidate for the seat in the Legislative Council, rendered vacant by the death of the late lamented Lauchlin McMillan, Esq.

No further proceedings were heard at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon.

Disturbing Religious Assemblies.

THE case of J. J. Chappel vs. L. P. Tanton, for disturbing a religious assembly, was tried by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon and the defendant was fined \$1 and costs.

Mr. Chappel, on concluding his evidence, was briefly cross examined by Mr. Tanton, who wished to prove from the examination that the prosecution was malicious, and grew out of a spite of seven years' standing.

Mr. Tanton also gave evidence on oath to effect that on his attempt to ascend the stairs to the ladies' gallery he was not told by Mr. Chappel that the gallery was reserved for ladies only, but, on the contrary, he was seized by the throat, and told by Mr. Chappel, "They did not want things like him up there."

The Magistrate stated that the defendant's evidence was sufficient for conviction. He, therefore, imposed the above fine.

Who is the Father?

A JUDGE AND A LAWYER ATTEMPT TO FIND OUT AND GIVE IT UP—A PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND WOMAN IN THE CASE.

Judge Forsaith, of the Municipal Court of Boston, rendered a decision yesterday in a case that has been before him the past week, a case that taxed the utmost ingenuity of court and counsel to unravel, and which finally resulted in a doubt in the minds of both as to the exact circumstances surrounding it.

Mr. Evan H. Johns represented Sharpe as counsel, and among the witnesses sworn against him was Mrs. Mary J. Sharpe, who bore in her arms a 14-months-old child. A long time was spent in endeavoring to get at the bottom facts which led to the prosecution of Mr. Sharpe, but it was a hard task, so complicated was the evidence.

Mr. Sharpe saw nothing of his first wife till about 2 years ago, when, while on a business trip to Prince Edward Island, he met her, she still, at the time, living with the man Sweeney. Mrs. Sharpe No. 1, who appeared as the complainant in the present case, claims that she lived with Mr. Sharpe for a week in August, 1883, as his wife, and at divers other times up to the month of November of that year.
