

\$337.60 Daily Double Pay Highlights Racing At CDP

A whopping daily double payoff of \$337.60 was one of the highlights of a highlight-filled harness racing card held tonight at the Charlottetown Driving Park before a large Ladies Night turnout.

The big pay, only one of a number during the evening, came on the combination of Gallant Way and Taurida Bay in the seventh and eighth dashes.

The thrill-packed card was nearly marred in the eighth heat when Pixie Abbe and Jack Roscroft were involved in a spill near the 7-8 pole. However, both drivers and horses escaped serious injury and were able to walk off the track under their own power.

Upsets were plentiful and one horse was able to capture two dashes.

The feature AA pace was split by Betty French and Ginger E. with Peter Federal taking the runner-up spot the first time around and Betty French placing in the second dash.

Gallant Way driven by Don Seaman paced the fastest mile of the night in copping the second dash in 2:11.2 after Lady Lakeburna with Joey Arsenault up took the first dash.

Brown Budlong and Christie's

Best split honors in the 2:23 pace first division and Pixie Abbe and Taurida Bay divided the C pace. The curtain raiser was won by Eric's Peg in a fast time of 2:12.

Eric's Peg, Christie's Best and Pixie Abbe all took new personal marks. Pixie Abbe was the best win ticket of the evening paying \$45.40 while Taurida Bay paid \$40.10 to win the eighth dash.

The exactor on Betty French and Peter Federal paid a neat \$44.80; the quinella on Pixie Abbe and Belle Texas \$42.90 and the first daily double on Lady Lakeburna and Christie's Best \$41.60.

White Sox, Tigers Beaten; Giants Topple Pirates 4-3

San Francisco's Giants stayed on the heels of the National League leading Milwaukee Braves, edging Pittsburgh Pirates 4-3 Wednesday in the circuit's only day game.

In the American League, Chicago's White Sox lost ground to front-running Cleveland dropping a 4-2 decision to Washington, Boston handed Detroit its fourth straight defeat and sixth in the "T-ers' last eight games, winning 4-3.

Center fielder Bill Virdon's miff of a short fly with the bases full and one out in the ninth enabled the Giants to score the winning run. The blooper was hit by pinch hitter Leona Wagner. Virdon had the ball in his glove but dropped it in a collision with second baseman Bill Mazeroski.

McCORMICK WON
Mike McCormick, who took over in the top of the ninth when Pittsburgh tied the score at 3-3, was credited with his fifth victory. He has lost seven. Bonnie Daniels, third of four Pirate pitchers, was charged with the defeat.

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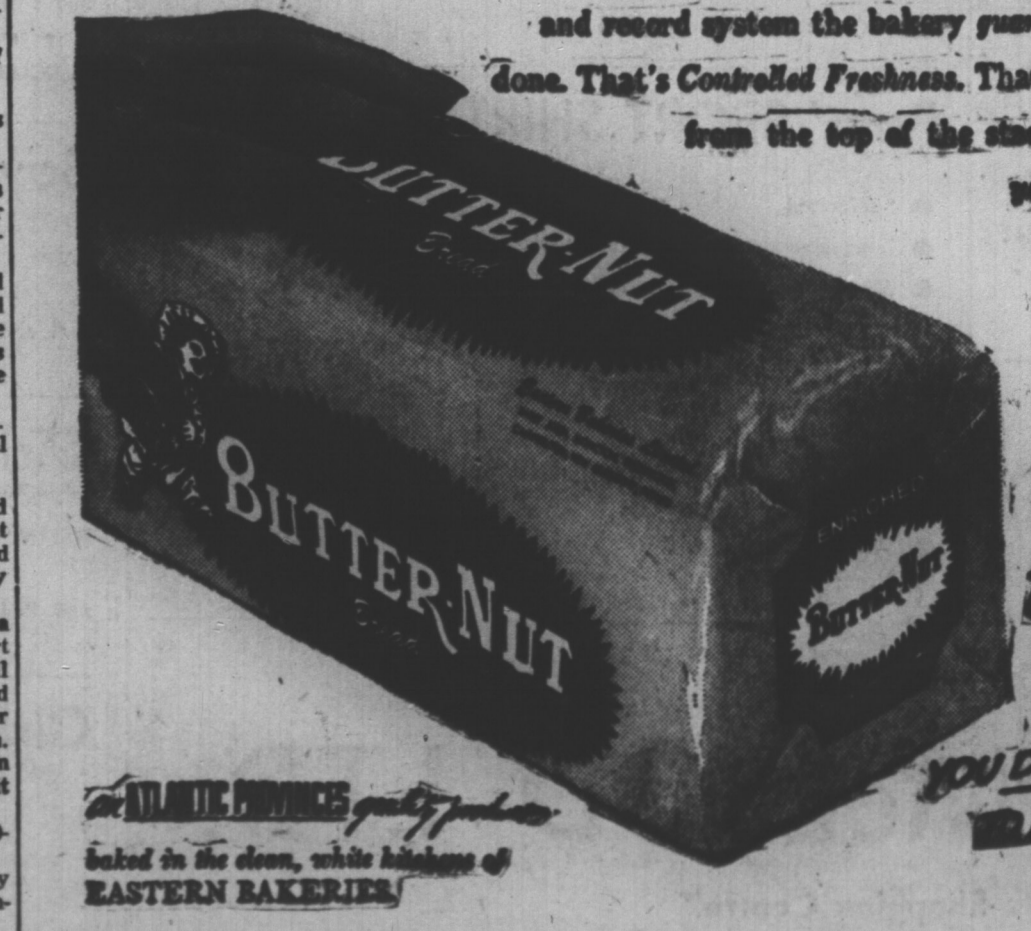
