### To Retaliate In U. S. Dairy Imports Freeze

#### British Oilmen Prepare To Leave Iran Today; Russia Eyes Prize

ABADAN, Iran, Oct. 2 —(AP)—Downcast British oilmen made their last preparations tonight to take their leave and surrender to the Iranians a vast oil empire built up through half a century. The evacuation, beginning at 9 a. m. tomorrow (12:30 a. m. EDT), is a black day for the Britons who are ending the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company's lucrative development of the rich oil areas. It is a triumph for those Iranians who had worked for this day since last March, when Iran nationalized the nation's tremendous oil resources. But it could prove worse than defeat, if these Iranians are unable to operate their own industry. Iranian oilmen can't quite believe that their dreams of kicking the Britons out are being realized. They credit President Truman with easing tension by his advice to Britain not to use force. Iranian sources said there were about 12,000 troops around Abadan who would have resisted any British landing attempt.

#### Escort British Out

The Britons, about 300 of a force which once totalled 3,000, are being escorted out by the Iranians. The Tehran Government rejected a British request that the

### Canada Fears Action May Set Pattern

OTTAWA, Oct. 2 — (CP) — Canada and 11 other countries will "retaliate" against the United States if it does not repeal restrictions on dairy imports, James Sinclair said today. The parliamentary assistant to Finance Minister Abbott said in an interview that the U. S. has about a month in which to eliminate the restrictions which Canada charges violates the terms of the General Agreement of Tariffs and Trade.

If the restrictions are not dropped, Canada and 11 other countries, including the United Kingdom, are prepared to withdraw some tariff concessions to the U. S., Mr. Sinclair said. The Liberal member for the Vancouver riding of Coast-Capilano returned Saturday from the Geneva meeting of the contracting parties of the G. A. T. T. The meeting of the 37 member countries is expected to run another month.

Mr. Sinclair said that the Netherlands wanted an immediate complaint filed against the U. S., so that retaliatory action could be taken at once. Canada suggested a postponement to the end of the session so that the U. S. might be given time in which to pass laws to remove the restrictions. They were imposed as a result of a rider clause attached by Congress to the U. S. Government's main defence production and price control bill.

The rider requires the U. S. Agriculture Department impose quotas on fats, oils, cheese and other dairy products while the U. S. Government is controlling prices. President Truman has already asked Congress to repeal it on the grounds that it is contrary to

#### Soviet Friendship Gestures

Soviet Russia made courtship gestures in Tehran in a bid to replace the United States in the role of Iran's big friend. Soviet Ambassador Ivan Sadchikov called on Mossadegh a few hours after the U. S. had supported Britain's successful appeal to the U. N. Security Council to take up Iran's expulsion of the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company.

#### Baking Firms Convicted Under Combines Act

CALGARY, Oct. 2 — (CP)—Mr. Justice Boyd McBride today found six western baking concerns guilty of operating a combine and fined the three major groups the maximum of \$10,000 each plus costs. After delivering the scathing 46-page judgment in criminal sessions of the Alberta Supreme Court he warned officers of the companies to mend their ways or face possible additional fines or jail sentences. The companies were convicted of conspiracy to prevent or lessen competition in the baking industry in Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia between 1933 and 1950. They were placed in three major groups for sentencing.

Mr. Justice McBride said the maximum fine of \$10,000 that he could impose was "quite inadequate" under the circumstances. Penalties imposed: McGavin Bakeries Limited, Winnipeg, \$8,000; McGavin Limited, head office, Edmonton, \$1,000; McGavin Limited, registered office, Vancouver, \$1,000.

#### Cabinet Minister To Accompany Tour

OTTAWA, Oct. 2 — (CP)—A relay of cabinet ministers will accompany Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh on their tour of Canada. There will always be one cabinet minister with them, officials said today, but the Ministers will spell one another off.

#### Royal Couple Rush Plans For Trip To Canada

LONDON, Oct. 2 — (AP)—Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh rushed preparations tonight for their trip to Canada, delayed by anxiety over the condition of the King. He is gaining strength after a lung operation. It was announced that the Princess, heiress to the throne, and her husband will start their flight to Montreal at 12:30 a. m. Monday (6:30 p. m. EST Sunday). Confidence prevailed at Buckingham Palace that there would be no further postponement of their journey which originally was to have been started by sea Sept. 25. #### Australian Wool Prices Advance

MELBOURNE, Oct. 2 — (Reuters)—Australian wool prices were again higher than normal at the Perth wool sales today but did not reach the peak recorded at the Melbourne sales Monday. Competition was keen with the United States and Britain in the forefront of buyers. There was an all-round increase in price of 10 per cent.

#### R. C. M. P. Provides Security For Royal Tour

OTTAWA, Oct. 2 — (CP) — Two flying squads of R. C. M. P. motorcycleists will follow Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh across Canada on the royal tour, an R. C. M. P. spokesman said today. The two eight-man squads will form part of the protection provided by Canada, which will assume practically all responsibility for the security of the royal couple.

#### Polio Immunization Possible Next Year

TORONTO, Oct. 2 — (CP) — Immunization of children, at least for short periods, against poliomyelitis, will be possible within a year. Dr. A. J. Rhodes, professor of virus infections of the Connaught Medical Research Laboratories, predicted today. Addressing a public health convention luncheon, Dr. Rhodes said it would also be possible to diagnose the disease with a simple test tube method.

#### U. S. Suspends Trade With Czechoslovakia

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 — (AP)—The United States Government today virtually suspended trade with Communist Czechoslovakia. The Treasury and State Departments invoked technicalities which experts predicted would block about 90 per cent of Czech imports to this country. This was the latest in a series of steps whittling down commercial relations between the two countries as political differences increased.

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### Telephone Company Submits New Rate Schedule For PEI

A new schedule of rates for the Island Telephone Company, Ltd., including the rates for hand set equipment in connection with the proposed dial service for Charlottetown, was submitted yesterday to the Public Utilities Commission. The Commission is now considering the application for presentation of the schedule at sittings to be announced later.

Among the expected heavy expenditures by the company in the near future is the conversion of the Charlottetown exchange from manual to dial service. The equipment for this conversion is on order, and it is expected that with satisfactory delivery in the latter part of next year, it will be installed and ready for use in mid-1953, provided that an adequate rate increase is obtained. #### Says Proposed Rail Rates Equalization Will Hurt Maritimes

SYDNEY, N. S., Oct. 2 — (CP)—Rand H. Matheson, manager of the Maritime Transportation Commission said today "all so-called rate equalization proposals so far evidence that they are the antithesis of what the Maritimes have been advocating." This was "structure to permit the greatest possible movement of traffic between the Maritimes and other parts of Canada, and not a structure that would further restrict and curtail our economic development for the sake of some abstract concept of rate equalization." In his report to the Maritime Boards of Trade, in Convention here, Mr. Matheson also announced the commission will meet next week to consider proposed federal legislation, incorporating the recommendations of the Royal Commission on Transportation.

#### More Immigrants Needed

The four Atlantic Provinces can support at least another 1,000,000 people, the convention was told in a report today. Dr. C. H. Blakeny of Moncton, chairman of the industrial development committee, was unable to attend because of illness. The report was read by A. F. Parkes of Moncton. Lack of immigration has definitely retarded the Maritimes, the report said. "While thousands of good citizens passed through our ports and are still coming each year, comparatively few settled in the Maritimes." The report recommended that: 1. The Provincial Governments be asked to unite to adopt an effective program to obtain new settlers. 2. If deemed advisable, a Maritime immigration commission be established. A financial plan would help immigration and give such aid to new settlers as may be necessary.
