West German Gov't Breaks Up Red Pre-Election Plot

BONN, (AP)—The West German government said Sunday it has broken up a Communist plot to disrupt next Sunday's parliamentary election by arresting at least 1,600 Red agents from East Germany.

About 1,000 were arrested in Helmsdorf as they crossed the East-West German border with forged travel permits.

Hundreds were seized in other areas—144 in the northern state of Schleswig-Holstein; 150 in the border town of Bebra; 130 in Coburg, another border point; 170 in Altenau, near the Ruhr; 30 in the southern metropolis of Munich, and 30 in the far-west Rhineland-Palatinate.

Carried Forged Papers
All carried forged papers and bundles of printed Communist propaganda and were well supplied with West German currency. Police said many admitted they were sent in by East German Communists to spread Red propaganda.

West German officials feared the agents also might try to start riots at election rallies and even disturb

the voting. One Communist disturbance was squelched at a Free Democrat party rally in Dusseldorf.

The main target of the agents was the industrial Ruhr, where Communists are concentrating their attacks against Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's pro-Western government.

Don Cherry Posts One-Up Victory For Golf Ch'ship

MONTREAL, (CP)—Don Cherry, the crooning golfer from Wichita Falls, Tex., took the advice of his caddy on the 36th hole of the Canadian amateur championship final Saturday and posted a one-up victory over Don Doe of Granby, Que., in a dramatic finish.

The 29-year-old American, who stroked his way through eight winning rounds of golf without exchanging a word with caddy Joe McComber was set to use a four iron on his second shot on the 430-yard hole with the uphill green. Joe then broke a week-long silence that paid off with the title and the Earl Grey trophy.

"You'll never make it," piped up Joe "Make your three iron."

The flabbergasted Cherry, who had roared from behind a three-hole deficit at the end of the morning 18-hole round to square it at the 29th, lose it at the 34th and square it again at the 35th, obediently switched clubs.

His three-iron shot from light rough stopped dead 20 feet short of the flag and he two-putted for a par four.

And the 32-year-old Doe, the dark horse finalist in a select field of 200 from Canada, the United States and Great Britain, including the 10-man British Walker Cup team, was in a perfect spot to win, or at least halve the hole. But he went against the judgment of his caddy.

Passes Up Advice
Doe's drive was down the middle with a clear shot for the green. He reached for his No. 2 iron, passing up the advice of his caddy who suggested a No. 1 iron—possibly the most difficult club to use for amateur or pro. He ended in a trap in front of the banked green and finished with a five.

It was all over, except for the prize-giving, but things really started in a Toronto night club two months ago.

Cherry, then entertaining with his crooning, was approached by a Royal Canadian Golf Association official who suggested that he compete in this 49th championship. And Cherry, who had never won a national tournament in his career, filled out his entry form.

That was the by-play to the week-long tournament with a cast including Joe Carr of Dublin, the reigning British amateur champion, and two former Canadian titleholders, Gordon Taylor of the host Kanawak club who won in 1932 and Walter McElroy of Vancouver, 1951 winner. All three were eliminated in the match-play tournament before the semi-finals.

Pre-Tournament Favorite
Cherry, a member of the U. S. Walker Cup team, was a pre-tournament favorite but it was up to Doe, the Cinderella kid who won the Canadian junior title 14 years ago, to supply the local-boy-makes-good angle. Just another name in the big entry list, he attracted notice first in the fourth round with a 1 up victory over Phil Farley, veteran Toronto shoemaker.

He followed it with a 3 and 2 decision over 22-year-old Bob Hall of Montreal, a surprising 6 and 5 triumph over Scotty Fraser of Panama City, Fla., in the quarter-finals, and an upsetting 3 and 2 victory over 37-year-old Jimmy Wilson of Scotland in the semi-finals.
