P. E. I. Presbytery Meeting Held At Murray Harbor North

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met on Tuesday in the Church at Murray Harbour North with the Moderator, Rev. G. B. Cunningham in the chair, and the Clerk, the Rev. T. H. B. Somers, at the desk. The Rev. H. B. Somers, at the desk. The Rev. G. C. Webster, Rev. F. N. Young, Rev. D. A. Campbell, Rev. D. Nicholson, Rev. J. D. MacKay, Rev. E. S. Hales, Rev. M. C. Currie and Mr. W. C. Lawson, Mr. R. A. Somers, Mr. G. MacDonald and Mr. H. G. Reid, Elders, the Clerk read the correspondence, the commission of fifteen Elders and reported that the Rev. J. V. Crawford, formerly of Marshfield had in August accepted a Call to Moss, Burns, in the Presbytery of London, Mr. Webster presented a Call from the Belfast Congregation in favour of the Rev. D. Ralph MacDonald, which was sustained and ordered forwarded to await his reply. The Clerk reported having received a Call in favour of the Rev. G. B. Cunningham to the Congregation of Scotsburn in the Presbytery of Pictou. The Rev. W. L. Young of Pictou and three elders were present to support the Call and a very large delegation of elders and members were present from the congregations of Alberton and West Point and spoke in highest terms of Mr. Cunningham's work and urged him to remain as their minister. Upon having the Call reviewed in his hands Mr. Cunningham requested and was granted time to consider.

Missionary Activities

Mr. Webster as Convener of Missions stated that all fields had been well supplied this past summer and all grants paid. Accordingly the Presbytery certified the work of Mr. Lawrence Blaikie, Mr. Gardner Dalzell, Mr. John Johnston and Mr. Lee MacNaughton. Petitions were received from both Kensington and Brookfield Churches requesting the services of Mr. Blaikie next year. The meeting was held in the hands of the Missions Committee. Mr. Webster then outlined the itinerary for the forthcoming visit to the Island of the Rev. F. C. Knox, one of the Church's missionaries from India.

Reporting for Youth Work, Mr. Cunningham stated that the Church Schools had paid in full the cost of the broadcasting of special programmes for them last spring; that the Camps were of a higher order of success than ever this year; and that the young people of the presbytery had decided to raise a fund of \$200.00 for the Church in Hiroshima, Japan, as well as support cost of the "A" project.

The proceeds of the sale of the Dundas property were turned over to the Camp Treasurer, Rev. F. N. Young who was authorized to proceed with the transfer of the title to the Trustees in Toronto. This property is now held free of debt. Rev. D. A. Campbell informed the Court of the gracious gift of additional land for the camp on the part of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Simms of French River and the warm thanks of the Presbytery were ordered expressed to the donors.

Pensions Report

Reporting on Pensions, Rev. D. A. Campbell drew the attention of the Ministers to the proposed Group Insurance Scheme available to all members of the Fund. Several in the court urged the men to avail themselves of this excellent provision. Budget, Rev. J. D. MacKay stated that a marked increase was noted over the Presbytery's Budget Givings as of this date last year. The recent General Assembly raised the minimum stipend to the new figure of \$2,600, plus travel allowance, manse and holidays.

Rev. J. D. MacKay was authorized to write the congregations not now paying that amount urging them to do all possible to bring it into effect by January 1st, 1953.

Rev. Donald Nicholson reported that the Gordon Gravestone had now been repaired and put in as good condition as the stone would permit.

Rev. D. A. Campbell reported on the Gordon Homestead Memorial and a letter was read from the Church Offices in Toronto offering help to the fund that has been established to erect a cairn and tablet on the property at Alberton.
