THE hockey league on Prince Edward Island headed by Summerside's Dr. Hillard Clark has changed its name. It is no longer the Island Senior Hockey League but has become the Island Intermediate 'A' Hockey League.

This decision was arrived at Sunday at Summerside when the league's executive and representatives met. The fact that no senior entry was expected from New Brunswick, plus the change to have a later playoff with New Brunswick on an intermediate 'A' basis brought about the decision to register intermediate 'A' with the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association.

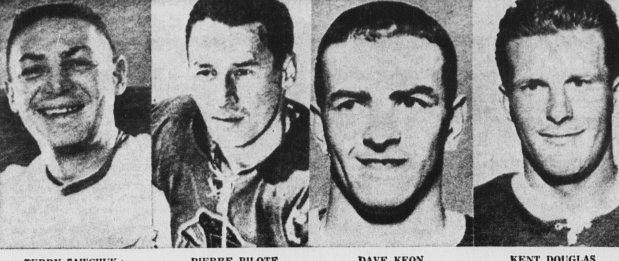
Leafs Take Dive

MONTREAL (CP) — Terry Sawchuk, Pierre Pilote, Dave Keon and Kent Douglas led the half-year honorees for individual trophies in the National Hockey League, it was announced Monday night. Sawchuk, the crew-cut goalie for Detroit Red Wings, held a narrow edge over Chicago's Stan Mikita in the voting for the Hart Memorial Trophy, the most valuable player award.

The league also announced the 23-year-old netminder was the victim of a "statistical error" when the half-season all-star tabulations were announced last week. The smooth center polled 20 points, most received by any player in the voting for all four trophies during the half-year. So far, in 44 games, he has been tagged with only two-minute minor penalties.

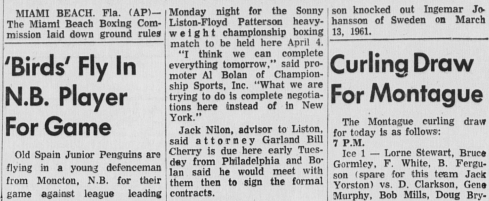
