

Dick Metz Wins St. Paul Open Golf Tournament

ST. PAUL, July 30—Dick Metz of Chicago with a total of 86-68 won the \$7,500 St. Paul open championship today with a total of 70 strokes for the 72 holes, a new tournament record.

Metz's four rounds were 68-66-88-68, breaking the old record of 71 set by Harry Cooper in 1935. The Chicago professional needed a birdie on the final hole for a cup and got it like a champion, reaching the green with his second and getting down easily in two putts.

On his final round Metz went out in 34 and came home with another 34. His card showed four birdies and he never was over regulation figures.

PROVINCIAL GOLF CHAMPIONS ARE CROWNED SATURDAY

Charles MacKinnon Rallies In Final Hole Of Tourney To Win Title By One Stroke

Charles "Fairways" MacKinnon, who did more putting on the greens than a broken down jalopie enroute to the World's Fair, is today the lucky holder of the Prince Edward Island golf crown.

In winning the championship by one-stroke at the 18th hole in a ding-dong duel with J. A. Likely on Saturday MacKinnon became provincial champion for the second time having achieved that honor in 1935.

He added a pair of 82's for a total score of 164 to win the title. Likely carded a sparkling 80 in the second round to add to his 85 at Summerside for a total of 165.

The veteran Hughes appeared a bit off in his driving but fought coolly and gamely to the last, and on several holes in the first nine staged brilliant recovery shots to finish even with his younger opponent.

The picture changed with the wind, however, on the incoming nine when Likely, hounding MacKinnon like a banker with an overcraft, came roaring from behind to take the lead at the 16th.

He gained one stroke at the 12th, and two more at both the 13th and 15th holes. MacKinnon, however, rallied to tie-up the round play at the 17th taking a par four for Likely's five.

MacKinnon drove the ball straight along the fairway in line for the cup and was on the green for a two. Likely drove to the right of the green in front of a clump of trees but it went into the woods on the other side of the green. He recovered brilliantly to the six feet from the cup, but missed the putt to chalk up a five.

MacKinnon played his ball coolly and two-putted to take the hole and championship. Hughes also finished with a par four.

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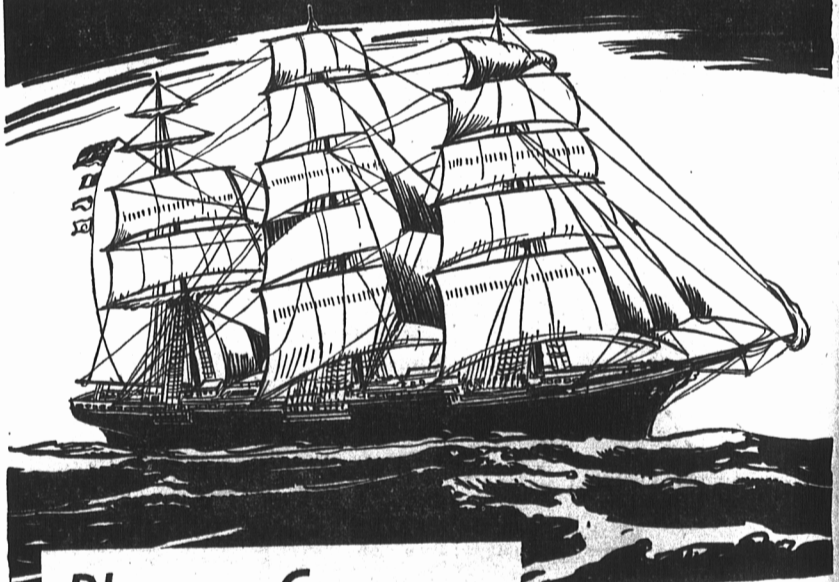
