Hydrographic Survey Party Arrives For Alberton Job

A hydrographic survey party has arrived in Alberton from Ottawa to complete the sounding of the coastal waters and harbours in the Alberton area. Officer in charge is Mr. C. Ledman, R.M. Cameron is senior assistant and F. Hochstrasser and J. A. Dupuis are assistants. The sea going party of the survey project is carried out in two sounding launches which arrived Saturday from Pictou, N.S. They are the "Merganser" and the "Teal". Crews of the launches are Joseph Purdy, senior gas engineer, Blanchard Thurber and Augustine Gallant. Coxswains, Thomas MacKenzie and Harvey MacPhail, Seamen. The launch crews remain aboard their ships and the remainder of the party have taken up residence in White's Apartments. The main base of operations is a room in the basement of White's store and the officer in charge is in radio telephone contact with the launches. Surveying operations are speeded up by the use of an electronic distance measuring device called the "tellurometer" invented in South Africa and capable of measuring distances up to thirty-eight miles with a high degree of accuracy. The sounding launches contain the latest Kelvin-Hughes dry paper sounding machines. The project is expected to be completed by mid-October.

S' Side Firemen Are Cleaning Up At Raceway

The Summerside Fire Department laid aside the hoses and rubber boots last evening as they concentrated on rakes and shovels in a drive to clean up the debris at Summerside Raceway where the department will present several race cards during the summer. The firemen have a big task ahead of them but with everybody pitching in, like many have last night, a lot is soon accomplished. Paint will be applied to a portion of the grandstand during the clean-up, and countless other items will need attention before the first card gets underway. The department completed arrangements over the past weekend with the estate of the late J. K. Curran to operate the Raceway for at least three cards, including Dominion Day and two race meets during Lobster Carnival week.

Condition Of Boy Improved

The condition of Robert Williams, 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Williams, Popular Grove, who is a patient at children's Hospital, Halifax, is much improved. The young boy was struck on the nose by a baseball bat at school on May 13 and started to hemorrhage on Sunday following the accident. From Tyne Valley Hospital he was taken to the Prince County Hospital and was then flown to Halifax.

Truck Seized By Fisheries Dept. Officers

A 1956 three-ton Mercury gravel truck, owned by Kenneth Hutt of Alberton South, was placed under seizure at Alberton Saturday night by officers of the Protection Branch of the Federal Dept. of Fisheries. The truck was followed by the officers in a car in a hectic chase from Alberton wharf which ended about one half mile away when the larger vehicle became bogged down in a swamp. The driver, not yet identified, took off into the woods but was successfully pursued by one of the officers. The truck was reported to contain approximately a thousand pounds of undersized lobsters which were later liberated in the sea. A bull-dozer was required to get the heavy gravel truck back to the road following an unsuccessful try with a truck. On May 10th a truck with about fifteen hundred pounds of lobsters was seized at Casumpec. Mr. Elmore MacKay is protection officer at Alberton.

Calm Restored In Panama

PANAMA (AP)—Strong national guard patrols restored calm in Panama during the weekend but talks between protesting students and the government apparently broke down over new student demands. The students rioted last week. They demanded that President Ernesto de la Guardia Jr. fire his education minister for what they called bad administration and three national guard chiefs for trying to halt student demonstrations. Eleven persons were killed in a destructive rampage Thursday.

Pictou Member Wants Hike In Unemployment Insurance

OTTAWA (CP)—A 40-per-cent increase in unemployment insurance benefits was proposed in the Commons Monday by H. Russell MacEwan (PC-Pictou). Mr. MacEwan said the suggestion which he endorses comes from the United Steel Workers' Union, in Trenton, N.S. If adopted, the increase would make available more consumer money and thus help the economy. Top insurance benefit now paid is \$30 a week. Mr. MacEwan, speaking during the throne speech debate, also suggested amendments to the National Housing Act to set a value on an owner's labor on his own home and consider it part of his downpayment for a loan. He proposed that the CNR embark on a five year car-building program to replace thousands of obsolete cars, and asked for a second car ferry between Carleton Place, N.S., and Wood Island, P.E.I. Mr. MacEwan said independent coal producers in his area depend largely on the Halifax market for their sales, but are hurt by freight rates. The Dominion Coal Board should consider paying a freight subvention on coal moving from Pictou to Halifax. G. Roy McWilliam (L-Northumberland - Miramichi) said northland development and the \$180,000,000 South Saskatchewan Dam are praiseworthy projects. But the senior partners of Confederation deserved as much. A causeway linking Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick had been promised before Confederation and was still unbuilt. He asked Defence Minister Parkes to reconsider the permanent layoff of civilian staff — 23 due this Saturday — at Renouval ammunition depot. This was no way to ease unemployment.

Cardinal Stritch Dies In Rome

ROME (Reuters) — Cardinal Stritch died Monday. He had been unable to take nourishment for two days. The end came a month after the 70-year-old Roman Catholic Archbishop of Chicago arrived in Rome. He was to direct the church's missionary activities as pro-prefect of the Congregation for Propagation of the Faith. Cardinal Stritch had been steadily losing ground since he suffered a paralyzing stroke a week ago. The stroke came three weeks after his right arm had been amputated above the elbow to eliminate the danger of gangrene from a blood clot. The cardinal was pronounced dead at 1:35 a.m. by Dr. Raimondo di Grandi, staff physician at Rome's San Spirito Clinic. Cardinal Stritch attained the highest rank in the Roman Catholic Church ever granted to a U.S. prelate. MEMBER OF CURIA He was appointed March 1, 1958, by the Pope as Cardinal pro-prefect of the Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith and as a member of the Curia, the supreme governing body of the church. This was the summit of a lifetime of achievement. Cardinal Stritch was born Aug. 27, 1887, in Nashville, Tenn. He received a bachelor of arts degree from St. Gregory's College in Cincinnati. He was sent to Rome to continue his theological education. While studying there he became a good friend of a young priest named Eugenio Pacelli, destined to become Pope Pius XII. Stritch

LOBSTER CATCHES LOW AT VICTORIA

Spring lobster catches are reported to be the lowest in many years in Victoria where Helvey Miller, brings his boat alongside the wharf, while Harold Ferguson prepares to tie up after 10 1/2 hours of lobster fishing. This boat, the first to return on Saturday afternoon, had not fished the previous day because of weather, but had only a little more than 10 lbs. of lobsters from 280 traps. Mr. Miller, who has fished lobsters out of Victoria harbour for the past 35 years said they had hauled up 40 traps without finding a lobster. He said that his rope bill would amount to about \$400 and that he has already used \$100 worth of gas and doubted that he and other fishermen in this area would do much more than break even on operating expenses for the season.

Award Verdict To Plaintiff In Automobile Insurance Case

The jury returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff, Roy Good, of Charlottetown, after 20 minutes deliberation, in an action for damages against the Service Fire Insurance Company of New York, the defendant, in Supreme Court, Summerside yesterday. Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGulgan presided. The defendant claimed fraudulent misrepresentations made in an application for insurance. The litigation asked damages in the amount of \$1,000 but judgment was not concluded yesterday and will be continued in Charlottetown at a day to be fixed later. The action resulted from a car accident September 28, 1957, when a 1953 Ford sedan owned by the plaintiff left the highway at Harrington on the Brackley Point Road, snapped of a power pole and sustained very severe damage. The car was driven by John M. Franch of St. John's, Newfoundland, a student at St. Dunstan's University. Three other S.D.U. students were passengers in the vehicle but none was injured seriously enough to require hospitalization. The plaintiff, Good, had bought the car at F. Earle MacDonald's, Summerside, on August 5, 1957, and when filling out an application for insurance during the negotiations, the answer to one of the questions on the application, which asked if the applicant had ever had his operator's licence suspended in the last three years, was recorded as "no". The answer to this question should have been "yes", as Good admittedly had his driver's licence suspended for three months in October 1956. Good in his testimony stated he told the girl, Miss Jean De-
