

Dies Suddenly While Landing Large Trout

The death of Benjamin Sharpe, 75, well-known Summerside man, occurred suddenly at Cape Wolfe yesterday when he suffered a heart seizure while landing a large trout.

As a young man the late Mr. Sharpe moved from his boyhood home in Pleasant Valley to Summerside, where he was employed for 50 years with the firm of R.T. Holman Ltd., retiring about four years ago as manager of the Men's Clothing Department.

The late Mr. Sharpe accompanied by his wife, and Miss Dolly Mathew, yesterday had motored to Cape Wolfe on a trout fishing trip. While attempting to land a large trout Mr. Sharpe was suddenly stricken by a heart attack and passed away quickly before medical aid could be summoned.

The late Mr. Sharpe is survived by his wife, the former Annie Stavert of Summerside, and by the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Jeanette Sharman, of Pleasant Valley; Miss Agnes Sharpe, and Stanley Sharpe, of Charlottetown; Mrs. Rufus Stevenson, of Hunter River; Mrs. Harry Weeks, and Mrs. Roy Weeks, of Fredericton; and Harold Sharpe of Pleasant Valley.

A 32nd degree member of the Masonic Lodge, the late Mr. Sharpe was also grand treasurer of the Lodge of Scottish Rites. The funeral with services conducted by the Masonic Order, will be held from the Presbyterian Church in Summerside on Thursday afternoon at 2 p.m., with interment in the People's Cemetery, Summerside.

EMPIRE EX In addition to being manager director of Wilfred J. Kennedy Ltd., Mr. Kennedy was also a director of several companies, and took an active interest in all public matters, and was a member of the Executive Committee of the Empire Exhibition held in Johannesburg during 1936-37.

It was customary for Mr. Kennedy to visit Canada every five or six years. His last visit was in 1948.
