

**Local and Other Items.**

THE "Prince Edward" cleared from New Orleans for Liverpool on the 3rd inst.

THE work on the breakwater at Point du Chene will be completed about the first of May.

THE Ontario Government has decided not to grant any money this year to promote railway enterprise.

AN attempt was made to assassinate the telegraph operator of the Intercolonial Railway at St. John, on Friday night last.

THE Brig *L. J. Westaway*, owned by D. Farquharson, Esq., from Cardiff for Demerara, with coal, put into Liabon on the 18th ult., leaky.

THE *Patriot* is incorrect in stating that all trains were late on Saturday. All trains arrived on time except No. 3 from Georgetown.

A QUEBEC DESPATCH says:—"An American ship 1,135 tons, has been chartered from Manilla to Montreal, with sugar, at \$10 per ton.

HONESTY EXTRAORDINARY.—The *Patriot* publishes a part of one of the resolutions passed at Cardigan, and leaves out the other part in which the policy of the Government is endorsed and Hon. Donald Ferguson complimented on his success in office!

CANADA SHEEP.—Large quantities of sheep and lambs from Canada continue to be sold in the American markets, and realize remunerative figures. About 3,000 sheep have recently crossed the line into the States at Brockville and vicinity. In New York the latest sales of Canada sheep and lambs are as follows:—56 sheep, averaging 110½ lbs each, 5½c. per lb.; 139 lambs, 77 lbs each, at 7½c. per lb.; 120 lambs, averaging 82 lbs., at 7c.; 80 sheep, 102 lbs. each, at 6c.

THE ST. CROIX, N. B., COTTON INDUSTRY.—A memorandum of association has been formed in connection with the St. Croix cotton factory enterprise. The capital has been fixed at \$400,000 in \$50 shares. Some \$11,700 were subscribed at a meeting on Tuesday evening, notwithstanding that those who were expected to sign for handsome figures were not present. Committees to solicit subscriptions in St. Stephen and Milltown have been appointed.

A DESPATCH from Castlebar states that a large number of the populace near Balla, Mayo County, entered a man's house who was about taking possession of the farm of an evicted widow, and compelled him to enter a coffin which they brought with them, and swear to abandon his intention. Being seriously frightened, the would-be tenant took the required oath, and the people departed without doing him any further violence. The incident created much excitement and amusement in the neighborhood.

MEANNESS EXTRAORDINARY.—The *Patriot*, of Saturday last, contains a short paragraph stating that the speech of Hon. L. H. Davies, during the short session of 1879, was stolen from that delectable sheet. Now, what are the facts? One of the enterprising sub-editors of the *Patriot* went to the official Reporter of the House, whom he knew, had taken a full report of Mr. Davies' speech, and piteously begged for a large portion of the said report! The Reporter good naturedly complied with the request, as he had frequently done on former occasions, for the same party, and read to the sub-editor—who took notes of the same—the portions of the report for which he asked. The conduct of the *Patriot's* sub-editor, in reference to this matter, is simply contemptible, and beneath any respectable journalist. During the session of 1878, the same official reporter, whom he now attacks, took the trouble to transcribe, at his request, a full report of the Budget Speech in advance of the *Parliamentary Reporter*, for publication in his paper, in order to oblige him. Behold the grateful return which the reporter now receives at his hands! Shame upon the *Patriot*! More might be stated respecting this matter, but, for the present, we will not extend our remarks.

ON Saturday night, at 11 o'clock, a fire broke out in Mr. William Larter's shoe store, south side Queen Square. "Big Donald" sounded the alarm, and the steam engines went to the scene with commendable despatch. The fire originated in the upper or third flat of the store, and when first discovered was but slightly burning. A gentleman credibly informs us that the greatest blaze to be seen in the apartment came from a box containing roofing felt and other material, and it might have been extinguished—on his arrival—with a small quantity of water. But this desired quantity of water was not obtainable, and the fire rapidly spread along the interior, and those present had to make a dash out to the lower flat. Mr. Larter's stock was then removed to Mr. Nelms' book store, and the stock of Mr. Boreham—who occupied the premises alongside (also as a shoemaker)—was removed to the Market House. The flames soon burst through the roof, and at times threatened to destroy the wooden buildings by which the burning one was bounded. But the firemen worked admirably. They confined the flames to the building in which they originated, and extinguished them shortly after midnight. The roof of the shop occupied by Mr. Larter was entirely consumed, as was part of the roof of the store occupied by Mr. Boreham. Mr. Larter's loss, we learn, is small, being chiefly in shoemaking machinery, material, etc. Mr. Boreham's stock was entirely saved. The shop occupied by Mr. Larter is owned by Mrs. Stamper, and the one occupied by Mr. Boreham is owned by Richard Meats, Esq. Both are insured.

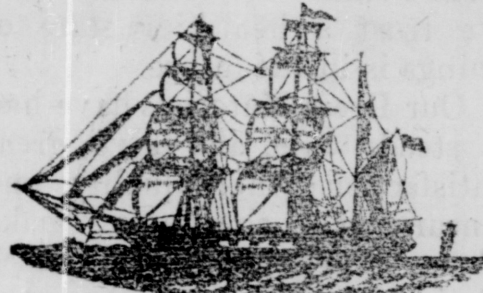
