SUMMERSIDE — Some 125 members of the Board of Trade and guests attended a banquet here last night to honor Group Captain A.G. Dagg, commanding officer of RCAF Station Summerside, who will be leaving the local station on retirement leave in approximately one month.

G-C Dagg has proven a popular figure since his arrival here four years and four months ago and proof of this was shown with the large turnout last night.

The dinner was held in conjunction with the board's monthly meeting and head table guests included Hon. J. Watson MacNaught, Mayor Walter Cox, Charlottetown; Mayor George Key Jr. of Summerside, Hon. Hubert MacNeil and guest speaker Cyril Leard of Alberton, vice president of the Maritime Board of Trade.

Speaking on education, Mr. Leard said that of the total number of students in Canada there are in the vicinity of 1,000,000 of above average intelligence. He added that there were 140,000 teachers in the nation but that only one in 40 was qualified to select and develop the gifted child.

## Speedometer Accuracy Said Reasonable Doubt

SUMMERSIDE — The case against Edgar Wedlock, Summerside, accused of speeding, was dismissed in County Court yesterday by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald. Evidence for the Crown was given by St. Eleanor's V.I.I. Constable Maxwell who said he had clocked the accused at 50 mph in a 40-mile zone. Wedlock denied having gone over the speed limit.

In dismissing the charge, Magistrate MacDonald said that there was reasonable doubt of the accuracy of Const. Maxwell's speedometer.

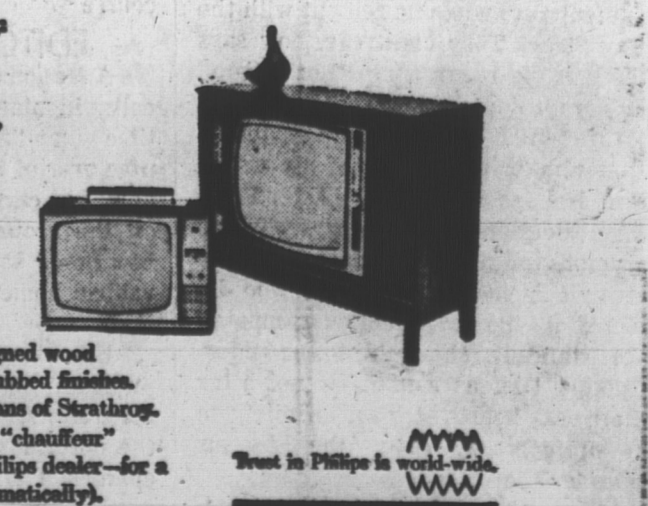
