**THEIR ACTION DREW HIS CONDEMNATION**

Some years ago, a series of conferences on the social issues of the hour was held in our western provinces, and in them a college principal raised the problem of political patronage. Some particularly flagrant example had aroused the public conscience and he drew attention to it as one case of a widespread abuse. He took the position that it was a betrayal of public trust for a man to be appointed to public office on any other grounds than his special fitness for the duties required. He stirred up a good deal of interest in the problem, but the old idea that "to the victors belong the spoils" continued notwithstanding.

It is well for leaders in social reform to notice how old is that custom and its abuses. It appeared even among the disciples of Jesus after years of His teachings on self-forgetful ministry. Evidently they were expecting Him at any moment to put forth His power and set up His throne, and each one became deeply concerned about his own position in the coming kingdom.

St. Mark tells us that the brothers, James and John, tried to steal a march on the others by asking Jesus for the seats of honor next to His throne. St. Matthew adds that their mother spoke for them. Jesus answered that such positions were not His to give, and then added comments on the principle behind their request that are still a judgment on human ambition.

"You know that those who are supposed to rule over the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great men exercise authority over them (or, impose their authority upon them.)" "But it shall not be so among you, but whoever would be great among you must be your servant, and whoever would be first among you must be slave of all. For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve and to give His life as a ransom for many." (Mark 10:42-45)

This saying was like a volcanic upheaval bursting through the crust of the world's customs and ambitions and shattering them beyond repair. It is true (and tragic) that they still persist, but every such action brings on itself the condemnation and contempt of all good men.

The question that this raises for aspiring youth is his own fitness for the job to which he aspires. Happy is the young person who goes to work or enters college with a definite object in view.

**DEEP DOUBTS**  
"We remember the deep perplexity of fellow-students who could not decide on what they wanted to be doctor, lawyer, teacher, business executive, or minister."

"We remember also the determination and earnestness with which others set themselves to qualify for a particular form of service. But there is a general preparation that everyone must make resolution to make the most of one's own life. We remember two boys who grew up in the same neighborhood—the one brilliant intellectually and the other dull. But there was a deeper difference in character than there was in their gifts, and the clever one never made anything of himself, while the other became a scholar and leader of the first rank. In beginning, the latter nearly killed himself in his effort to attain, but first he cultivated his own powers, and they brought his world to his feet. It is a petty religiousness that
