U.S. Steel Output Expected To Slip
CLEVELAND (AP) — A forecast for a continued gradual downward trend in steel production in the United States for the next few weeks was issued Sunday by Steel magazine.
 Steel producers will continue to reduce big inventories of semi-finished material and users will liquidate some of the stock they accumulated during the first quarter, the trade publication said.
 However, the impact of inventory adjustments will be cushioned by a seasonal increase weakening of the market during the second quarter, Steel predicted.
 Shipments to the construction industry—steel's second biggest customer — and to structural fabricators, oil producers and consumers will pick up appreciably as the weather improves said Steel.
 "If the seasonal gains are accompanied by heavy production of autos and appliances, steelmaking in the second quarter will be at an annual rate of 100,000,000 ingot tons," the magazine said.
 Steel production last week was estimated at 2,170,000 tons, a 5.3 per cent drop from the previous week.

PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — President and Mrs. Kennedy will visit Mexico from June 29 to July 1, it was announced Saturday. Dates for the previously reported visit were given with a statement expressing cordial relations between the United States and Mexico.

Kennedy Gets Sharp Blast For Steel Price Actions

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican congressional leaders have unloaded some of their sharpest criticism of President Kennedy since he took office 15 months ago, claiming he used police state methods to "black-jack" steel companies into rescinding a price increase.
 In a statement released Thursday, they charged Kennedy with ordering or supporting nine actions last week that "imperiled basic American rights, went far beyond the law, and were more characteristic of a police state than a free government."
 These "punitive, heavy handed and frightening" actions amounted to "a display of naked political power never before seen in this nation," said the statement issued on behalf of Senate Republican Leader Everett Dirksen of Illinois. Charles Halleck of Indiana and other Republican leaders in Congress.
 Eight steel companies announced \$6-a-ton price increases last week but later backed down in the face of strong opposition from the president, who said such increases were not in the public interest.
BACK JUDGMENT RIGHT
 The Republican statement said "we condone nothing in the actions of the steel companies except their right to make an economic judgment without massive retaliation by the federal government."
 The statement said these nine actions were ordered or supported by the president:
 1. The federal trade commission publicly suggested the possibility of collusion, announced an immediate investigation, and talked of \$5,000-a-day penalties.
 2. The justice department spoke threateningly of anti-trust violations and ordered an immediate investigation.
 3. Treasury department officials indicated they were at once reconsidering the planned increase in depreciation rates for steel.
 4. The internal revenue service was reported making a menacing move toward U.S. Steel's incentive benefits plan for its executives.
 5. The Senate anti-trust and monopoly subcommittee began subpoenaing records from 12 steel companies, returnable May 14.
 6. The House anti-trust subcommittee announced an immediate investigation.
 7. The justice department announced it was ordering a grand jury investigation.
 8. The department of defence, seemingly ignoring laws requiring competitive bidding, publicly announced it was shutting steel purchases to companies which had not increased prices.
 9. The FBI began routing newspaper men out of bed at 3 a.m. on Thursday, April 12, as well with President Kennedy's press conference assertion that "we are investigating" a statement attributed to a steel company official in the newspapers.
 Treasury department officials said they had never considered retaliatory action involving depreciation schedules.
 The internal revenue service said it had never made "menacing moves" toward U.S. Steel's executive benefits program.

Tax Relief For Party Aid Being Considered In U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy is expected to send to Congress soon a message incorporating recommendations of a bipartisan commission that tax relief be granted to political contributors and that legal provisions for election campaign spending be tightened.
 Action on the commission's recommendations is unlikely before this year's congressional elections, however. Influential members of the House of Representatives say they have found colleagues unenthusiastic about acting at the current session.
 The commission, which submitted its report to the president this week, said mass participation in United States political life should be encouraged by tax incentives.
 The commission estimated over-all political spending in 1960 at between \$165,000,000 and \$175,000,000. It rejected the time being the idea of government subsidies for campaigning.
 To counter a popular notion that contributing to political parties is somehow a shoddy business, the commission recommended these alternative methods of encouraging voters

N.Y. Stocks Make Gains During Week

NEW YORK (AP) — Steels continued to decline last week but the stock market as a whole made a moderate recovery, posting its first weekly advance in five weeks.
 So far as the steels were concerned, Wall Street drew no encouragement from President Kennedy's press conference statements that he bore no ill will toward the industry. Following cancellation by the steel industry of a \$6-a-ton price increase, the investment community (attentive to Kennedy's statements) apparently anticipated something more concrete from the president, possibly some new evidence of help in what the steel mills regard as a "profit squeeze."
 The steels, after perking up a bit, slid downward again. On the week's trading U.S. Steel fell 2 1/2 to 63 1/2, Bethlehem 1 1/2 to 41 1/2 and Republic 3/4 to 52 1/2. The rest of the market did well on balance, responding to selective investment demand.
DECLINED MONDAY
 Wall Street began the week with news that industrial production had moved up to a record pace in March and that non-farm employment was at a peak for mid-March. After declining Monday, the list advanced Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. The markets were closed Good Friday.
 The Dow Jones industrial average advanced 6.15 to 694.25, climbing back above the "support level" penetrated in its 11.73 decline to the previous week.
 The Associated Press average of 60 stocks rose 2.90 to 254.50. Volume for the four-day trading week totaled 12,459,120 shares compared with 15,924,308 or the five days in the week before. Of 1,462 issues traded, 530 advanced and 467 declined.
 The most active issues on the New York Exchange were U.S. Steel, up 1/2 at 63 1/2 on 273,800 shares; Brunswick, up 3/4 at 36, and Bethlehem, off 1/4 at 40 1/2. Most active on the American Exchange were Brazilian Tractor, up 1/2 at 4 1/2 on 148,100 shares, and Atlas Corp. warrants, up 1/4 at 1 1/4.

 Macdonald — John A. Macdonald's wife and his successor — is immensely pleased that the president as our representative from Kings when this pregnant decision was proclaimed.
