### CECIL RHODES.

#### On the War and Its Results.

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 11.—Cecil Rhodes received an ovation today when he was appointed the President of the Congress of the South African League.

In his address he attributed the South African war to "mugwumps," and said that but for them Mr. Kruger would never have dared to send an ultimatum to Great Britain.

Generally speaking, Mr. Rhodes was conciliatory in his remarks. He declared that now that "Krugerism" had vanished Great Britain would establish a Liberal Government which would do everything possible to unite the interests of South Africa with those of the Empire.

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### BRITISH ELECTIONS.

#### Ministerialists Now Have 357 Seats, The Opposition 205

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Oct. 11.—The Liberals have been doing far better in the Parliamentary general elections than they did in the boroughs.

Yesterday they gained two more seats in Cardiff and the Otley division of Yorkshire. This equalizes the party gains. The Ministerialists and the Opposition have now gained 27 seats each.

Apart from Sir Henry Campbell Bannerman's reduced majority in the Sterling burghs, and the success of Sir Edward Reed at Cardiff, a seat formerly held by Mr. James M. McLean, prominent in Indian affairs, who did not seek re-election, there is little of interest in yesterday's elections.

The Ministerialists now hold 357 seats and the Opposition 205.

Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, addressing his supporters after the poll had been declared, said that he was satisfied with the result considering the state of the register and the most disadvantageous circumstances for an election that an ingenious government could devise.

### AN INSIDE VIEW.

#### Of the Working of the Government Machinery.

TORONTO, Oct. 11.—The Mail and Empire says: It is not generally known that not many moons ago, the Liberal party came near losing its chief whip, Wm. Gibson, M. P. When Judge Senkler, County Judge of Lincoln died, it was proposed to appoint to the vacant judgeship Mr. James Redmond O'Reilly, then of Prescott, but for some time previously a resident of the United States. Mr. Gibson would not have any such importation into this country, and he went the length of threatening to resign his seat in Parliament if the appointment was made.

Mr. O'Reilly's friends were "importunate" and a place had to be found for him so that he is now County Judge of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry. The Mail and Empire prints a transcript from the books of the Court of Record at St. Paul, Minn., showing that Mr. O'Reilly, though now a Canadian judge is actually a citizen of the United States, he having on March 30, 1887, appeared before the clerk of the Court mentioned and made formal oath declaring his intention to become a citizen of the United States, thereby forswearing his Canadian citizenship.

### Japanese Belief.

COLOGNE, Oct. 10.—A St. Petersburg despatch to the Gazette says:—

"According to advices from Japan the removal of the Chinese Court to the interior has destroyed the belief in the sincerity of the Chinese promise of reform."

"It is therefore considered in Japan that it would be impracticable to withdraw any more Japanese troops from China at present."

### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Montreal Gazette remarks that "his is the kickers' happy time in the Liberal party. Mr. Langevin kicked and got a judgeship. Mr. Ellis kicked and got a senatorship. Mr. Robidoux kicked and got a judgeship too. The quiet man gets leave to vote for Mr. Tarte and emergency rations deals."

—Bribing the press is the latest move of the New Liberals. What do the Old Liberals and the people of Canada generally think of this? The Montreal Star well remarks that Mr. Tarte's ingenious letter to Mr. De Montigny, editor of Les Debats, in which he offers fifty dollars a week from September 17 until three weeks after the Federal elections for the privilege of controlling the political opinions of the paper is eminently characteristic not only of the Tarte methods but of the Laurier Government's methods. A similar bribe was offered by an agent of Mr. Clifford Sifton to Mr. W. G. King, the editor of the Brandon Independence. Mr. King says that Sifton's agent "put it forward as a matter of business; there was no sentiment in it; it was dollars and cents."

### MORE TROOPS
