George Michael, Well Known Saint John Businessman, Dies Suddenly

Charlottetown businessman, George Michael, died suddenly in his car Saturday afternoon. He was 65.

Mr. Michael was with his father and had just stopped for a 100 sign at the intersection of Cumberland and Grafton streets and he reportedly took a heart attack.

Vice-president of Michael Brothers wholesale firm in Charlottetown for the past 20 years, Mr. Michael was an ardent sportsman and took great interest in fishing and horse racing. He was also a member of the Charlottetown Curling Club.

He was born in Charlottetown, the son of Mr. and the late Mrs. Thomas Michael and was married to the former Muriel Alton of Amherst, N.S.

He is survived by his wife, one daughter Carol, 18, a student at Mount Allison University; six brothers, Wilfred, Edward, Frank, Charles, John and Michael, all in Charlottetown; and two sisters, Dorothy, in Charlottetown, and Emma, Mrs. Stanley Lefty.

The remains are resting at the O'Leary Funeral Home until 10 a.m. Tuesday. The funeral will be held from St. Peter's cathedral with service commencing at 10:30 a.m. Interment will be in the church cemetery.

Cancer Society's City Unit Opens Campaign For \$3,500

The Charlottetown Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society will open its campaign this week to raise \$3,500 which is the local objective in the coast-to-coast drive for \$319,000. The provincial objective is \$100,000.

C.W. Peters, provincial campaign chairman, says he hopes that each unit will not be satisfied with simply attaining its objective, but that the zeal of workers will attain such momentum it will carry them well beyond the minimum required.

"I feel confident this will happen," said Mr. Peters. "Because the opportunity to help a fellow human being is one of the few remaining holdouts among the physical ailments of mankind, it welcomed by most people. Folks all over Canada appear to be glad to join up with some of the best brains in the country to fight what is, after all, a common enemy."

R.M. Jones, president of the Prince Edward Island Division of the society, points out that the money collected during the campaign will be used for these purposes: to finance research into the cancer and possible cures; to promote the education of the public on the facts of cancer; principally the fact that the earlier the treatment of cancer can be started, the better; and to give aid and comfort to cancer patients.

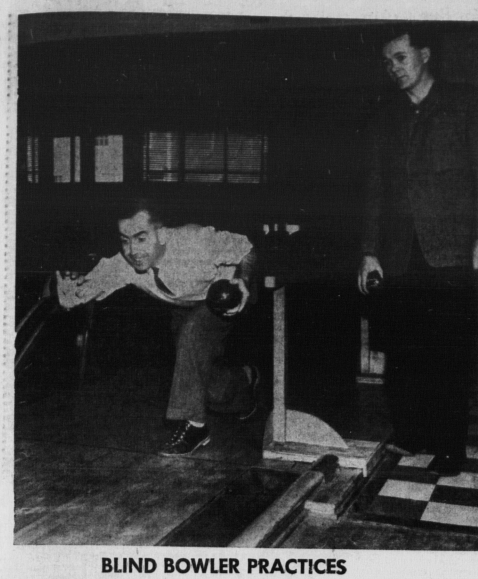
