

Veteran City Marksmen Stars in Dominion Shoot

CHARLOTTETOWN, (CP)—A 65-year-old Charlottetown man, Ralph Jenkins, admitted Friday he was the luckiest he's encountered in the 25 years he's been attending the Dominion Rifle Association matches.

But his complaints came after he won the Ottawa event, Friday's feature match on the range, 7 miles west of Ottawa, by scoring a possible 500 points from 300 yards and adding 49 of a possible 50 at 600 yards.

His 98 total gave him a one-point margin over three other competitors.
