

Joint U.S.-Canadian Trade Comm. Meets Second Time

OTTAWA (CP) — High-ranking Canadian and American cabinet ministers will confer here Sept. 26 in a one-day attempt to iron out trade and economic problems that might cause friction between the two countries.

Trade officials said today the main item on the agenda will be the U.S. wheat disposal program which the Canadian government has criticized as interfering with commercial markets for Canadian wheat.

Date and place of the second session of the Joint U.S.-Canadian trade and economic committee was announced by the external affairs department which had been trying for months to get the Americans to agree to a firm date.

PEARSON CHAIRMAN

The first meeting was held in Washington March 16, 1954. The two countries had agreed to hold a meeting at least once a year. State Secretary Dulles will head the American delegation which will

include Agriculture Secretary Benson, Treasury Secretary Humphrey and Commerce Secretary Weeks.

External Affairs Minister Pearson likely will be chairman of the meeting. Other Canadians will include Trade Minister Howe, Agriculture Minister Gardiner or Fisheries Minister Sinclair and Finance Minister Harris.

Under its \$1,000,000,000 surplus food disposal program, the U.S. is giving away some wheat free and selling some for local currencies. At last year's meeting, the U.S. government pledged that its program will not infringe on commercial markets.

However, Mr. Howe informed the committee a few months ago that the U.S. has been using its disposal program in some commercial market which have reduced or halted purchases of wheat from Canada.

HAVE OTHER PROBLEMS

Trade officials said that in addition to the disposal problem, Canadians may appeal to the U.S.

ministers to reduce import restrictions, particularly in oats, barley and other farm products.

Delegates also may discuss world tariff negotiations that are to take place in Geneva early next year and the future for the proposed permanent body for the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

W.C.T.U. NOTES

Iceland is a country illustrating the effect of international co-ordination of effort on the alcohol problem. Iceland had prohibition at one period, but through the action of two other countries this regime of prohibition was defeated. One of Iceland's essential exports is fish. Spain refused to buy Iceland's fish unless Iceland imported Spanish wine, and the power of international trade was evident when France strongly supported Spain in this action.

The temperance sentiment is strong in Iceland. Out of a population of 148,000, nearly 24,000 people are members of temperance organizations, the Order of Good Templars being the largest. "Operation Bluejay" was a completed reality before Americans were apprised of the fact that a huge new air base was being constructed at Thule, in northwest Greenland. To construct this base far above the Arctic Circle, five thousand men or more, with all the modern and technical skill. These civilians labored as much as seventy hours a week at premium wages under the supervision of Army engineers. Included in the crews were a number of alcoholics, according to Knute Lee, one of the Protestant chaplains stationed there. These alcoholics went to that icy land with the promise that there would be no alcohol at the job site. However, it wasn't long until some others wanted booze. So, contrary to the promise, beer was brought in. Soon drunkenness became a problem, with many jobs being lost because of drinking.

Parts of Scotland Have Gone Dry

GLASGOW (CP) — Parts of Scotland have gone dry. Water went on the ration list in Arrochar village, Dunbartonshire, where wells have dried up. Water has been cut off in Kiermuir, Angus between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. daily, and workmen at Lochliphead, Argyllshire, are rushing a pipeline to carry water three miles to the town.

An appeal went out Friday advising Scots to take baths "only when absolutely necessary." There was no report on the supply of alternative beverages.

- prospective requirements for industrial and social capital.

Briefs must be in writing. At least ten copies, or more if possible, should be forwarded, and should reach the Secretary of the Commission, Room 400, Daly Building, Ottawa, Ontario, by the 3rd of October.
