Street Paving At Georgetown On Monday, July 23rd the County Construction Company began putting Kent and Water Streets in shape for paving. A great number of dump trucks have been engaged in hauling gravel from the pit at Kilmuir and this, when dumped, on the streets has been quickly spread by two road machines.

When the gravel reached the height of the engineer's grade marks, the machines continued to make numerous trips over the streets, leveling off. Then a narrow-hike arrangement, which was attached to the road machine, worked the top gravel up again to allow it to dry out, to receive the oil coating. The heavy roller then rolled the surface to a billiard table-like smoothness and the oil sprayer then sprayed on the oil priming coat.

This was then dusted with a fine coating of dry sand and left for two days before the asphalt was put on. By Wednesday, evening, July 25, the graveling was practically completed and the oil applied on Water Street and the length of five blocks on Kent Street.

Grain

WINNIPEG, July 30 — (CP) — Oats and barley prices showed declining tendencies in dull trade today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange under selling prompted by week-end rains. Rye and flax prices were irregular. Commercial demand was thin in oats and bar-purchases, and mostly limited to shipper.

Flax closed some buying and covering in the nearby contracts, and prices moved higher. The October fell off.

American houses were on both sides of the market in rye, with selling predominating in the deferred months. Some indication of seaboard demand was noted in the nearby contracts.

Export loadings of Canadian wheat included 800,000 bushels to the United Kingdom and 350,000 to Italy.

I.W.A. and class two wheat prices were down one-quarter cent from Saturday.
