TO THE PUBLIC.

AFTER no little amount of labour, not to speak of the leather worn in visits to a J. P., and dragging little children thither to be sworn, I observe that the veritable William McIntosh has conceived and brought forth a self-condemning absurdity in the 'Progress of 28th ult., which not only most fully contradicts itself and everything previously maintained by its author, but shamefully exposes his family in making them appear as if they were guilty of the most heinous crimes...

But let us examine the contradictory statements of the little child. His son declared and that at the hour of his death, too, that the injuries received were on the leg, ARM AND ANKLE, and that severe pains existed in those parts, although no pain or hurt on his leg was even hinted of during his illness, and the public will observe that the boy, in his last declaration, does not mention that he received a hurt in his head or his other knee. But the unfeeling father contradicts his sons last declaration, where he says, that at no time during his illness did he complain of pains save in his two knees. And Mary Ann (the little girl) swears that he complained of his head and knee only, thus believing the former statement made by himself and father. The little boy said he was struck with STICKS AND A STONE, so does little John, but Mary Ann again swears that it was a STICK AND STONE only, thus again contradicting one another.

Mr. McIntosh declares that his son was in perfectly good health on the morning in question, but Mary Ann again to the rescue and swears that he always complained of his head. Here we have witness against witness, testimony against testimony, and a stern affidavit against a solemn declaration, surely where there is such discord, the fabric of lies must fall to the ground, and the covetous slanderer will be shunned and detested by saint and sinner. McIntosh asserts that a decl. ratiion of hurt received was made by his son of his own will, but those who visited his house at that time know this to be a lie, as it is well known that he often questioned and coaxed his son to answer his, "Didnt he strike you there, Willie?" and it is also known that his son often refused to answer the question thus put, feeling, no doubt, that it was not true. O shame where is thy blush! I want the public to understand that the sticks spoken of were, according to McIntosh's story, thrown at his neck, and that he was not hurt as the other boy has it. Mr. McIntosh said, when his boy was first known to be sick, that it was his knee was hurt, and the boy complained of nothing else, for some time, until the internal disease of which he died, according to the Doctors' evidence, had laid fast hold of him, and then he complained of other parts, and as was very natural his head, and the father explained that these pains arose from hurts, but the boy is known to have refused to say so. A close examination by parties, of the head and other parts said to be struck, resulted in their not being able to discover any sign or symptom of a hurt or bruise, nor could the veritable Mr. McIntosh himself show any marks when asked to do so, either by one of the Physicians or to others, save a small pimple on the arm where he said his boy got a blow from a little stone two years ago, although he denies it, and I would add that he ought to know whose boy he did it, as it appears he is well acquainted with magical performances and spirit rapping.

From the fact that McIntosh admits that no mark existed upon any part, save the arm, struck two years ago, and into which he had driven the pain from the knee, as he blandly told the Physicians, it will be plainly seen that he is only giving circulation to slander to satisfy a poor spite he holds against my family on what account it is hard to tell. If sticks weighing four pounds each would strike his boy, would they not leave marks, or would they not lame the boy so that he could not walk, or if in the head would they not start him, but instead of this the worst home and cried because he did not want to go to school as the father stated afterwards; went to school where he spent the whole forenoon showing no symptom of being hurt, played with the other children, and went home saying he would not go to school any more, and crying because he was desired to go back in the afternoon. This is the testimony of his parents when he was first taken ill. The father called upon the teacher in the afternoon, and told him to keep him but a half a day no mention of a hurt at this time, and when John went to school next day, being asked what kept his brother home, said that he was chasing out the geese and fell down and hurt his knee. The two physicians give as their opinions that he did not die from any injuries he may have received, but from some internal disease, and this with the contradictory evidence of the children, and the want of a single mark on the places said to be struck is enough to convince any candid person that he never received a blow. I would also observe that when I heard his boy was dead, I sent word that I desired a thorough investigation of the matter, a Coroner's Inquest, and Mr. McIntosh was informed of this, yet he would not take those steps, for his statements were false. I would now ask him to put the matter in Court, or I am willing to have a certain number of honest men to investigate the case. I would now ask the public, who has the appearance of truth, the man who desires an investigation of the matter, and gives good reasons for disbelieving his (McIntosh's) story, or the one that makes contradictory statements and fears justice. But the man who beifies himself and exposes his family as Mr. McIntosh has done, must be moonstruck and ought to have our commiseration, and I would remind him that this is not the first slander to his shame only but it is spoken, and if he will not take steps to obtain a clear investigation of the whole matter, it will be his wisdom to hold his unru y tongue.
