Explosion at Lynn.

LYNN, Mass., Oct. 26. The Lynn Gas and Electric Co. suffered a serious loss at 2 a. m. to-day, at the electric light power station on Pleasant Street, by the exploding of a large fly wheel, twenty feet in diameter, on the one hundred horse power Corliss engine used for running the arc lights for street lighting. Two sections of the wheel went through the walls, tearing out two large holes. One struck a wooden building adjoining, tearing out a section of the side frame. The other wiped out the power station office. No one was hurt. The total loss is between \$10,000 and \$15,000.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Oct. 26. Five capital cases are now pending before the Minister of Justice for report as to commutation, viz., Birchall, of Woodstock, execution fixed for Nov. 14th; Morin, of Montmagny, Nov. 21st; Blanchard, of Shelburne, Dec. 12th; Day, of Welland, Dec. 18th; LaMontagne, of Sherbrooke, Dec. 19th.

Hon. Mr. Foster was interviewed yesterday by representatives of various steamship lines with reference to cold storage for special lines of Canadian freight. They are quite willing to make the needful arrangements, but contend that no special fillings are necessary in winter.

The Behring Sea Matter.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26. The statement telegraphed from Canada upon the authority of a British member of Parliament that it had been resolved to submit the Behring Sea fisheries dispute to arbitration, is premature so far as it may be taken to imply a complete agreement on the parts of both governments. It is learned that correspondence on the subject is still in progress, but there are hopeful signs that a satisfactory settlement of the vexed question will be reached at a comparatively early date.

Yellow Fever.

BOSTON, Oct. 26. The British steamer Arisag arrived at this port to-night from Havana in charge of the first mate. Capt. Scotland died of yellow fever last Thursday and was buried at sea on Friday. The steamer is now at quarantine. The steward is yet on board with fever. The quarantine doctor says he is recovering. Captain Scotland was 40 years of age, a native of Scotland, and leaves a widow and five children.

Nothing to Say!

HALIFAX, Oct. 26. Hon. Robert J. Bond, Colonial Secretary of Newfoundland, who has been on a visit to the United States and interviewing Secretary Blaine and Sir Julian Pauncefote, alleging that he had been authorized by the British Government to seek a reciprocity treaty for his Colony in the city en route for home. He refuses to make any statement as to the success of his missions.

High Tide.

ROSDOUT, N. Y. Oct. 26. The Hudson River to-day showed the highest tide in forty years. Brickyards suffered enormously, and millions of bricks were lost.

Resuming Work.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Oct. 26. The Newcastle, Wallsend and other mines are resuming work, and the strike is virtually ended.
