Ass'n For Retarded Children Hears Talk By Psychologist

Mr. Russel Ewing, psychologist addressed the regular monthly meeting of the P.E.I. Association for Retarded Children on April 9th at West Kent School.
Mr. Ewing traced the history of intelligence tests as far back as 1904 when Alfred Binet of Paris Franch devised a scale for testing intelligence.
This method was revised in 1916 in the U.S.A. Group testing was first used with the army in 1917.
Mr. Ewing demonstrated articles employed in carrying out I.Q. tests with children. The speaker stated that "individual testing proved much more satisfactory than group testing."
Mr. Ewing's talk was of great interest to all present.
Mrs. Stewart Pierce thanked the speaker and commented on the very important work he is doing.
Mrs. Prevost Way reported that arrangements for the special supper meeting with the Advisory Board were almost completed.
A draft of the brief prepared by the Canadian Association for Retarded Children and to be presented to the Minister of National Health and Welfare was reviewed and approved in principle.
Mr. Berrigan reported that the delegation from the P.E.I. Association who presented a brief on March 6th to the Executive Council of the Provincial Legislature were received and given the assurance that the brief would be given careful consideration.
Mrs. Roland Taylor was named chairman of the tag day committee while Mrs. Gordon Humphrey was appointed editor of the Helping Hand which is published three times a year.
Mrs. MacCarville was appointed to act in the sick committee while Mrs. Wendell Cadmore and Mrs. Charles Smith were in charge of refreshments.

Premier Explains Procedure In House Recess Incident

A matter of procedure and the fact that one of the members is "hard of hearing" was the explanation Premier Matheson gave yesterday morning of an incident which took place in the House Wednesday evening.
The Premier said he was making reference to the occasion because press reports made it appear that he was trying to stop the budget debate "by telling G.E. Saville (Liberal 5th Kings) that he could not speak."
HOUSE RECESS
What actually took place was, Dr. L.G. Dewar had completed his speech on the budget debate at 6:00 o'clock, the time set for the House to recess for an evening session, if one is to be held.
When Dr. Dewar sat down, Mr. Saville, rose to his feet. The Premier reminded him that it was 6:00 o'clock but Mr. Saville seeing the Premier speaking to him but not catching what he was saying, announced that he would adjourn the debate.
This of course is not according to parliamentary procedure - the debate cannot be adjourned when the House goes into recess. The Premier, therefore had to raise his voice in order to make the member hear and said No. No - it's six o'clock, meaning that Mr. Saville could not adjourn the debate but would merely continue when the House met after recess.
Mr. Saville said yesterday, he still did not catch what the Premier said and asked, as a matter of clarification, whether he would have the floor when the House met later in the evening. Mr. Saville said he did not interpret the occasion as an attempt on the part of the Premier to close the debate and noted that the House Leader had "always been lenient with him in allowing him to speak." He blamed the situation on his inability to hear what was being said.

Disagree On Marketing Plans

VANCOUVER (CP) — A witness and a member of the price spread commission 4 a g l e d Thursday over the merits of compulsory marketing after the witness declared farm marketing boards were "evil and dishonest" and should be abolished.
Basil Gardom, president of the Independent Milk Producers' Cooperative Association, maintained before the seven-member commission that if a plebiscite were held, British Columbia producers would vote against the compulsory marketing boards 2 to 1.
That might be the case in British Columbia but not in the Maritime, interjected commission member J. Howard MacKichan of Halifax, 63-year-old manager of the United Maritime Fishermen Limited, a large fish co-operative.
A plebiscite on Cape Breton Island had shown that farmers there were unanimously in favor of having their production sold through compulsory marketing boards with returns pooled among the producers.
NOT REPRESENTATIVE
Perhaps all the Cape Breton farmers had voted, countered Mr. Gardom, a man in his mid-70s, but he knew of one B.C. area.
