ARRANGEMENTS for the St. John Centenary Exhibition are being rapidly pushed forward, and the enthusiastic accounts published in the New Brunswick papers augur well for its complete success.

England's Relation to Ireland.

As the close of the present Session of the British Parliament approaches, debates of an unusually recriminatory nature are being indulged in.

In no time of her history has the latter country attempted so much for the former. A great part of the Session has been spent in discussing her wants, while important measures relative to England and Scotland, to the great injury of both these countries, had to take second place.

Referring to the recent debate in the Commons, the New York Tribune's London correspondent characterizes it as most disgraceful. The Parnellites did not hesitate to attack in the coarsest manner the personal character of the Crown Attorney at Dublin, while Lord Spencer was said to have permitted the execution of an innocent man and Mr. Trevelyan was declared by Mr. Parnell himself to be almost as bad as Mr. Forster.

The London Times commenting on an article recently published in the Berlin North German Gazette, referring to the attacks of French journals on Germany, and declaring that France alone threatens the peace of Europe, says this criticism of the Gazette is unjust and inexplicable.

the bourses of Paris, Vienna and Berlin to fall. The press everywhere express surprise at the Gazette's attack on France and wonder what its object is.
