**POLICE COURT**—A woman for failing to have her child attend school for the required number of days during the month of April, was yesterday given a warning by Magistrate Martin and ordered to report to the court on June 5. The complaint was lodged by the Department of Education after it was reported that the Truant Officer had called upon the woman fifteen or more times, from which no satisfactory reports were obtained. In addition to the above two persons charged with vagrancy were each sentenced to thirty days in jail and a third on a similar charge was remanded until the twenty-third. **MAGISTRATE'S COURT**—In the docket confronting Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet yesterday morning there was only one case which did not constitute a violation of the Highway Traffic Act. Charged with overtaking and passing on a grade, the accused pleaded not guilty and the case was adjourned until the twenty-third.
