QUIZ

You are the dealer, neither side vulnerable, and have opened One Heart. Partner has responded Two Hearts. What do you now bid with each of the following four hands?

1. ♠A75 ♥AQ87 ♦KQ5 ♣KJ5
2. ♠A5 ♥97642 ♦A6 ♣AK94
3. ♠AK5 ♥AJ743 ♦K82 ♣QJ9
4. ♠AJ72 ♥AK9865 ♣—♦AJ5

1. Three notrump. The two heart bid may assume many forms but, in general, it represents 6 to 9 points, whether in high cards, distribution, or a combination of both. It follows, therefore, that a combined holding of at least 26 points exists, and a game somewhere must be undertaken.

A two notrump rebid would be inadequate. Responder is not required to bid again and might pass. The three notrump bid is not necessarily the final say in the matter. If responder, because of distributional features, thinks four hearts is a better contract, he is at liberty to bid it. The leap to three notrump merely advises partner that the opener's hand is flexible enough and big enough to play for game at either notrump or hearts.

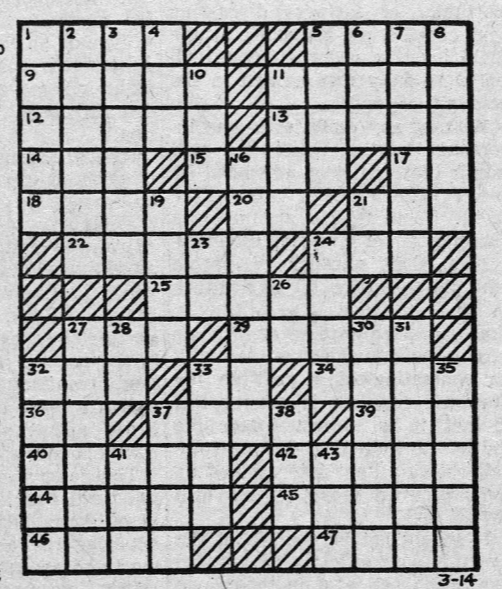
2. Four hearts. Here is an illustration of a hand that rises tremendously in value because of the nature of partner's response. Thus, if partner's reply had been

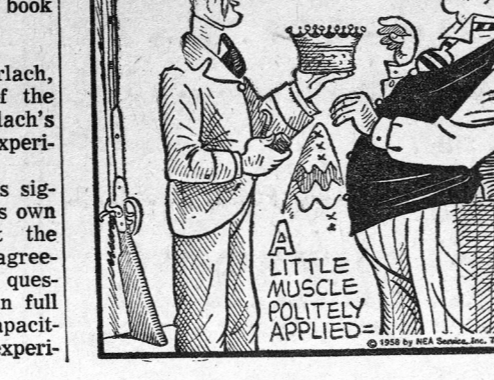

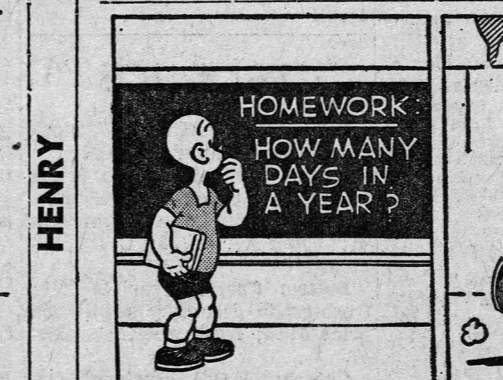

Who Owns Copyright — Book Written Under Hypnosis

MUNICH, Germany (AP)—Can a doctor claim royalties for a book his patient wrote with the aid of hypnotic treatment?

That's a question that may make German literary history. It involves a new novel, *The Betrayed Army*, about the 1943 battle of Stalingrad.

The author, Dr. Heinrich Gerlach, 49, a teacher and reserve officer, was captured with thousands of other German soldiers at Stalingrad.

In a Siberian prison camp he wrote the first manuscript. It was confiscated in a camp search.

But Gerlach had copied the original, in almost microscopic letters, into a thin exercise book. A friend, about to be repatriated to Germany, hid it under a false bottom of the wooden box containing his belongings.

Soviet secret police agents spotted the copy. Gerlach was jailed in Moscow while police conducted a painstaking investigation lasting several months.

Repatriated in 1950, he rejoined his family and tried to write his book a second time. But frustration overwhelmed him. He had forgotten everything in a complete mental blackout.

He was on the verge of quitting in despair when he read about a Munich psychotherapist who used hypnosis to help patients regain lost memories.

In trance-sleep on the couch of the hypnotist, Dr. Karl Schmitz, the past came back to Gerlach.

After some digging into Gerlach's youth, Schmitz touched the subject of the war. Frantic outbursts followed and suddenly Gerlach's pent-up memories were released. Speaking in a staccato style, he was able to tell again about the hell he lived through at Stalingrad.

BOOK NOTES

A secretary took notes. Some of the sentences jotted down later appeared to Gerlach to be verbatim excerpts from his first manuscript.

After the treatment ended, Gerlach took the notes home and started to write. The experiment had set the wheels in motion but it took Gerlach five more years to complete the book.

When Frankfurt illustrated a magazine ran an advance series on the book. Schmitz remembered his former patient. He also remembered an agreement signed between him and Gerlach in 1951 in which his patient promised him a 20-per-cent share of the gross proceeds if the book were ever published.

CLAIMS SHARE

Schmitz wrote to Gerlach, claiming that two-thirds of the novel were dug out of Gerlach's memory by his hypnotic experiments.

Gerlach does not deny his sign-off was the product of his own hand. Gerlach countered that the nature is under the 1951 agreement. But he asserts it is questionable whether he was in full possession of his mental capacities at the time of the experi-
