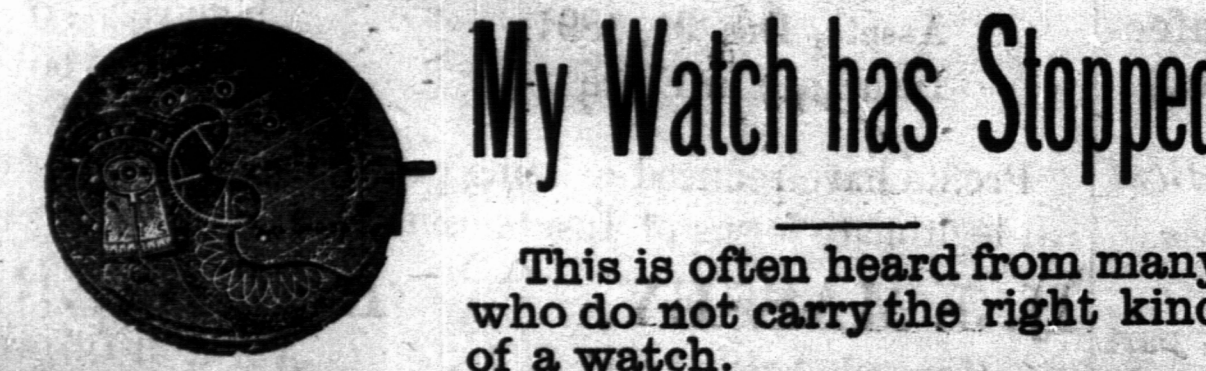

The Steamer Abraham Sutcliff arrived at St. John's, Nfld., Friday evening, a run of 50 hours from Ch'town. Her cargo of live stock is all right. She will leave St. John's this morning for Cape Breton, to load coal for this port, for the owners.

We are glad to learn that Miss Maclean of Long Creek, reported ill with diphtheria, is recovering. No other cases have appeared in the vicinity, but two children of Mr. William Macdonald of Argyle Rear are down with this infectious disease, which has been so prevalent in this and adjoining districts for the past few months.

MR. J. J. GAY'S horticultural stall presented an attractive appearance on Friday. It was well supplied with a beautiful assortment of blooming pansies, daisies, carnations, forget-me-nots, etc., as well as everything that could be desired in the line of vegetables. It was certainly a fine collection for this season of the year.

MR. JAMES McMAHON, of Rocky Point, was out in his boat Thursday evening when the squall came up, and in trying to make Holland Cove, was blown off and carried up to Nine Mile Creek wharf. The wind was accompanied with hail, and this together with the billows breaking over them almost benumbed the men in the boats.

The markets were well attended yesterday, but as a general thing trade seemed dull. The low prices obtained for farm produce of every kind causes a scarcity of money, which is no doubt felt more or less in every department of trade. Large quantities of hay came in and sold at from 50 to 54 cents per cwt. Potatoes were, as the farmers state given away at from 18 to 18 cents per bush. Oats has advanced a cent, 33 cents being paid yesterday. The beef market continues dull, the good supply of fresh fish having a tendency to lessen the demand for beef. The inside market was fair and prices ruled about the same as last market day.

A RUNAWAY occurred on Main street, Friday afternoon, which caused quite a commotion, and was almost attended with serious results. A horse, owned by Mr. Lemuel Wood, in a light driving wagon, broke loose from a post, where he was tied, on Grifton street, and ran madly across Queen street. He struck against the post at Apothecaries' Hall, then sheared off on the sidewalk and barely escaped running over a baby carriage containing a young child of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Dawson. The wheel of the wagon caught the wheel of the baby carriage and sent it spinning, but the child escaped unhurt. The horse continued his mad career till he reached the London house corner, where he got clear of the carriage by overturning it against a post, and continued his flight down Richmond street to the water.

TRADE seems unusually dull in the city at this season of the year. This is, no doubt, owing to the low prices obtained for farm produce of every kind. This is essentially an agricultural country, and the prosperity of every department of trade must largely depend on the prices realized by the farmers. When oats, potatoes and live stock bring fair prices, debts only cannot be paid, but the farmer feels obliged to purchase larger supplies of goods, and more of the conveniences of life. We had an instance of this last spring, when oats brought 40 cents per bushel, and potatoes 50 cents. Trade was brisk, although there was not nearly the quantity of produce in the country. Farmers who held their potatoes and oats from last fall have missed it badly, as the prices are fully lower than they were then, and the loss by shrinkage is very large.

MR. D. J. McLEOD, Superintendent of Education, has issued a circular to each school district of the Island, through the secretary of trustees, calling the attention of the rate payers to the importance of observing the proper order of procedure in holding the annual school meetings which take place on the 21st of June, inst. The various requirements of the Public School Act in this connection the violations of which render the business transacted at the annual school meetings throughout the Island, invalid, are carefully pointed out, and other explicit directions given, which if observed, would prevent many a quarrel and lawsuit in the school district. Secretaries are especially requested to remember that notice of such annual school meetings must be given by posting notices at least six days previous to the meeting, on the three most public places in the district, the school house to be one of them. To be forwarded to be far famed, and Supt. McLeod's idea of calling attention to these things is worthy of commendation.
