## Newfoundland's First Railway AND THE DONANZA WHICH ITS AMERICAN BUILDERS HAVE STRUCK.

Advices from St. John's, N. F., no  
Tuesday say: The New York and  
Newfoundland Railway company formally  
commenced the work of railroad con-  
struction on this island to-day. Shortly  
before noon the first sod was turned  
under the management of Mr. Bolland,  
an engineer of European reputation, and  
several squads of navvies are now  
busily engaged in grading those  
sections of the road that had been pre-  
viously located. The two termini of  
the road are St. John's on the south and  
the north shore of Notre Dame Bay on  
the northerly end. Concurrently with  
the inauguration of the railway work in  
St. John's there is reported from un-  
doubted source a gold find of extraordi-  
nary promise at Ming's Bight, close to the  
very spot where the New York company,  
at least for the present purposes termi-  
nating their line. The proposed 400  
miles of railroad now actually begun run  
through the whole of the principal metal-  
liferous belts of the island, and the capi-  
talists of New York, who have secured  
this golden contract with the Newfound-  
land Government, will daily dis-  
cover to their extreme satisfaction,  
as the work progresses, that in  
their eight mile alternate blocks along  
the whole line of railway they have se-  
cured mines of rich, rare and undoubted  
wealth, from which the means of build-  
ing a half-dozen Newfoundland railroads  
such as the one contemplated can be ob-  
tained. The Premier of Newfoundland  
and Mr. Blackman, the manager of the  
New York company, are now in London,  
and will leave for St. John's by the next  
Allan steamer. Mr. Blackman will  
then proceed without delay to New York,  
and there organize and dispatch to St.  
John's several corps of engineers for  
the immediate location of the whole line.  
The work of construction is now calcu-  
lated to be brought to completion within  
two years.

## Queer French Lawsuits.

DID TWO GIRLS MARRY EACH OTHER? A  
SUIT FOR DIVORCE BY A MILLIONAIRE  
HEIRESS.  
PARIS, Aug. 3.—No one can reason-  
ably blame the petition which Mlle. Mar-  
tinez y Campos has addressed to the  
French courts for the annulment of her  
marriage with Count San Antonio, de-  
scribed as the "grandson of Marshal  
Serrano." Mlle. Martinez y Campos,  
relative of the "Pacifier of Cuba,"  
was married last October. She  
was two and twenty years of age,  
and brought with her a dowry of  
5,000,000. The Count was only 20,  
and not nearly so well off. It was a love  
match, people said, and after the cere-  
mony the young couple started for  
London, there to spend the honey-moon.  
Only when the case is pleaded—and not  
then entirely, if the tribunal, as I fear,  
should elect to sit with closed doors—  
shall we know all the circumstances of  
that eventful journey, which has for  
sequel a demand for separation on griev-  
ances of which the one stated is:—"She  
believed and hoped to have married a  
person of a different sex from her own."  
Mlle. Martinez y Campos' demand is  
natural, yet, as a Parisian daily remarks,  
"One point is obscure; the petitioner does  
not state whether the bride and groom are  
both boys or both girls. Is the grandson  
of Marshal Serrano only the Marshal's  
grand daughter? Should Martinez y  
Campos be entered on the parish register  
as a male Martinez? The case is serious,  
and more so as it is impossible to suppose  
that the relatives of the young persons  
should always have been ignorant of their  
sexes. Decidedly we are in presence of a  
mystery."

## War to the Bitter End.

A MOSLEM MANIFESTO CALLING FOR A  
HOLY WAR.  
A Paris journal has issued that an Arab  
manifesto has been issued from Mecca,  
and is now being distributed among the  
Mussulman populations. It reads thus:  
"Brothers, you know that Islam is  
threatened at the present moment with  
complete destruction. England is mis-  
tress of India; France possesses Algeria,  
and Russia, after having conquered  
Turkestan, has made war against the  
Ottoman Empire in order to deprive it  
of nearly all its posts in Europe. Bro-  
thers, in the war carried on against us,  
the watchword is to exterminate all  
Mussulmans. Arm yourselves, there-  
fore, and concert together as a means of  
repelling Christian domination and up-  
holding the Caliph of the whole Mussul-  
man world.  
Another Ottawa mystery is reported  
A woman at midnight on Sunday saw  
the body of a man dragged by three men into  
a plot of tall thistles. No trace of the  
body can be found or explanation of the  
occurrence given. The disappearance of  
Mr. Blanchet of Ottawa has been ex-  
plained. He took the wrong train for  
Prescott and went to Montreal instead of  
to Ottawa.  
The Wesleyan Methodist Conference of  
Great Britain is the first ecclesiastical body  
to authorize the public use of the Revised  
Version of the New Testament. It has  
done so at its recent session in Liverpool  
in deciding to quote from this version  
Scripture proofs to be used in the new  
series of catechisms now being prepared.  
If the Revised Version comes into general  
use in the Sunday-schools it will not take  
long for it to secure full recognition and  
authority in churches.  
THE Times says: "Although there will be  
no general amnesty of 'suspects' in Ireland,  
it is stated that Father Sheehy, Kettle, and  
about six others, will be liberated before  
Parliament rises."

## Most Remarkable Eyes.

MIRACULOUS RECOVERY OF SIGHT—ONE  
EYE A TELESCOPE, THE OTHER A MICRO-  
SCOPE.

(New York Times.)

Last winter a gentleman living near  
Litchfield, Conn., took his daughter, six-  
teen years of age, on a sleigh ride. The  
day was cold, but very sunny. On their  
return the girl complained of her eyes.  
The trouble grew worse, and finally the  
girl was kept in a dark room and there  
remained with no ray of light until a few  
days ago, when she experienced a pecu-  
liar sensation which she describes as  
follows:—"It seemed as if my eyes were  
running out, or part of them. Putting  
my hand up to my eyes I could feel  
something coming out over my lower  
eyelids which I took hold of and pulled  
out. It gave me some pain to do so, but  
almost immediately my eyes felt better.  
Instead of a smarting sensation when I  
winked, they felt cool and natural,  
and it was a pleasure to wink them.  
Then came the thought,  
"Why, my eyes are better, and I believe  
I could bear the light," which thought  
was so impressed upon my mind that I  
was determined to try. Hesitatingly I  
opened the door, when to my great joy I  
found I was able to bear the light as well  
as I ever could. The feeling that came  
over me at the moment that I found out  
that I could once more leave the dark,  
dismal room and see the glorious sun-  
light again was so overpowering that I  
gave one scream for joy and then fainted  
away."

Now comes the strangest part of the  
story. Six months ago the girl's eyes  
were straight and natural; now the girl  
is cross-eyed, but she pays no attention  
to that. She sees things just the same  
as she always did, but let her close her  
right eye and look out of only her left  
eye, and she can see a distance of eight  
or ten miles, and distinguish things as  
well as an ordinary person can only sixty  
rods away. She is able to look clear to  
the lake, a distance of three and a half  
miles, and identify any one, describing  
their dress even. The distant hills are  
brought close to her, and she can see the  
farmers getting in their hay, even counting  
the number of heaps, which, in an air line  
are seven miles from her. To test her,  
a field-glass was used, and her sight  
would far out-reach any object that could  
be seen with the glass.

If she closes her left eye and looks out  
of her right, then she cannot see any-  
thing except close to her; but that eye is  
a perfect microscope. She is able to  
distinguish things that the natural eye  
cannot see. The point of an needle looks  
as blunt as a crowbar, and it is wonder-  
ful to hear her describe the beautiful  
colors of flies and other insects. To her  
the hair on a person's head look as large  
as darning-needles, and in the finest linen  
she can count the threads as easily as any  
one can count bean-poles. The moment  
she opens both eyes they assume the cross-  
eyed expression of shape, and then she  
sees again as any other person. It is the  
intention of her father to take her to New  
York at no distant day to let some of the  
celebrated physicians see this wonderful  
phenomenon. The girl herself is a very  
bright, pretty girl, but very timid.

The letting of shootings in Scotland this  
year is very profitable to the landed pro-  
prietors, who care more far the "sillier"  
than for the sport. A shooting of 7,000  
acres in Aberdeenshire is rented for \$17,-  
000 for the season by a Manchester cotton  
lord who forty years ago had not as many  
pence. In the same district a shooting of  
10,000 acres lets at \$5,000 a season, with a  
probable bag of 1,600 grouse, low ground  
game and good fishing. The family place  
of a peer in Inverness-shire lets at \$20,000  
for the season. This includes a famous  
forest of 28,000 acres, also 1,300 acres of  
well-stocked wood, and 11,000 acres of  
mixed shooting. The highest rented shoot-  
ing in Scotland, and the best, is Black  
Mount in Argyllshire, which extends over  
80,000 acres, and is leased by Lord Dudley  
from Lord Bradalbane at \$24,000.

The European rabbit has been so prolific  
in New Zealand that its extermination has  
become a Government duty. Although  
"run-holders" have for years been en-  
deavoring to get rid of this pest—and in  
one case no less than 180,000 rabbits were  
cleared off in one year—individual effort  
has signally failed to attain the desired  
result. It will be an amusing circumstance  
if the fate of a New Zealand Government  
should ever depend upon the fate of poor  
"Bunny" yet from the present indications  
such is not impossible to be the case.

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
