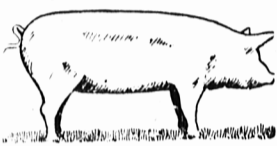

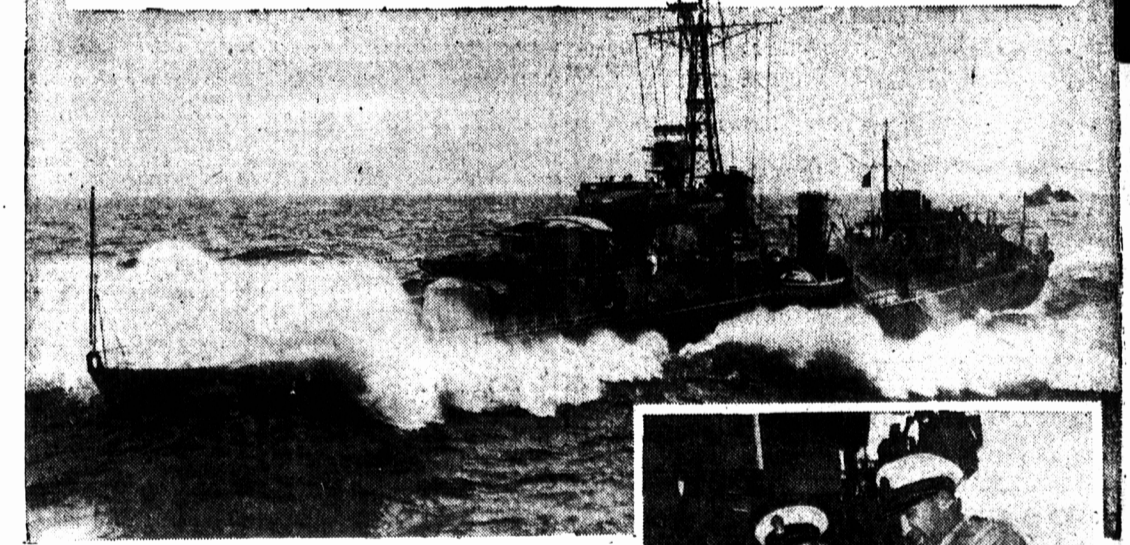
Collection amounted to \$1.10. Next meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. Roland Paynter when roll call will be answered by an exchange of Christmas gifts.

Commissioned in the Royal Canadian Navy August 30, 1943, HMCS Haida saw almost continuous duty until war's end in Europe. With the 10th Destroyer flotilla late in '43, engaged in offensive patrols against enemy destroyers and E-boats in the English Channel and along the French coast. On April 26, 1944, with sister-ship, the original HMCS Athabaskan, and units of the Royal Navy, engaged German Elbing class destroyers in the Channel. One enemy ship was destroyed, two badly damaged.
