Former Cdn. Record Holder In Swimming To Give Classes Here

Mr. Walton Sharpe, Director of Sanitary Engineering Division of the Provincial Department of Health and Welfare, was appointed Chairman of the Technical Committee for Swimming and Water Safety at a meeting of the Provincial Red Cross First Aid, Swimming and Water Safety Committee.

The meeting was held earlier this week under the chairmanship of Mrs. Manning Bagnall.

Mr. Sharpe, among his other accomplishments, is an experienced swimmer and instructor and following his recent appointment this week, has volunteered his services to conduct advanced swimming classes for swimmers in this area who wish coaching for the forthcoming 'Y's' Men's Queen's County swimming meet to be held here on August 5th.

He will commence his classes at two o'clock today at the Red Cross bath-house at Brighton Beach, and all classes will be free of charge.

Held Four Canadian Records

Prior to the war, Mr. Sharpe was among Canada's leading amateur junior and senior swimmers and held four Canadian swimming records as a member of the Central Y. M. C. A. swimming team at Toronto, Ont. An active competitor in the Dominion swimming competition since he was eleven years old, Mr. Sharpe broke his

first Canadian record, the fifty yard junior back-stroke, at the age of twelve. Some of these records still stand.

Since then, he has been a member of relay teams that held records in 200 yard free-style and medley competition in both junior and senior divisions. He competed in and won events at the Canadian National Exhibition Labor Day swim meet at Toronto, which holds international recognition in swimming competition. He has also been an instructor of competitive swimmers since he was 14 years of age.

This is a wonderful opportunity for local swimming enthusiasts, both boys and girls, senior and junior, and all advanced swimmers are invited to attend the classes.

Local swimming enthusiasts, particularly those planning to compete in the Queen's County swimming meet to be held here early next month, and possibly the Provincial meet on August 30th at Summerside, will be pleased to learn that they have a top-notch instructor available who is really qualified and willing to help them improve their swimming technique and ability.

The instructor in question is Mr. Walton Sharpe of the Provincial Department of Health and Welfare, who was recently appointed chairman of the swimming and water safety committee of the Red Cross. Mr. Sharpe's qualifications date back to when he first started competitive swimming at Central Y. M. C. A. team at Toronto at the age of eleven. He has been the holder of four Canadian amateur swimming records in both junior and senior events, setting up his first record at the age of twelve in the 50-yard back-stroke event.

He has offered his services to conduct free classes and give of his wide knowledge of competitive swimming for all those who wish to take advantage of the opportunity and who are planning on competing in the forthcoming County and provincial swimming and diving meets. All the present Red Cross swimming instructors are going to attend the instructional classes, which will mostly be of a practical nature.

Here is another one from "Krotz Problems" for you ball enthusiasts to figure out concerning a run scored on a double play, as laid down by Billy Evans, the author. "There were runners on first and third with one out. The batter hit a long fly to deep left field. The runner on third believed the ball would be caught. Also he felt certain it would be an easy matter for him to score if the ball was ultimately caught or dropped. So he played it safe by returning to third, tagging up and waiting for the proper time to legally advance. The runner on first was equally certain the ball wouldn't be caught."

"The moment the ball was hit, and sure it would go for extra bases, he started on his way to the plate. He was almost to third when the coach at the base was convinced the catch would be made. He finally made known his belief to the runner, who reversed his field and started to return to first base, where he was when the ball was hit."

"The outfielder made the catch. Naturally, the runner on third who tagged up had no trouble scoring. However, the outfielder, who went out to take the relay from the outfielder, got the ball to the first baseman ahead of the runner trying to return there. This completed a double play that retired the side. Can a runner on third properly score on such a double play that retired the side?"

"Yes. The runner can properly score and in this instance did. It was the runner on first who was at fault for running wild on the caught fly ball. All the runner on third had to do to properly score was to cross the plate before the third out was made. This he did. It was not a force third out, hence the run scored. Since third out is only possible when a base runner must advance to make room for the batter. In this play the batsman was out on a fly ball for the second out."

Braves, Phils And Cards In Three Way Tie For Top Spot In Nat. League

The National League race was just about as tight as they come today—a three-way tie for first place between Philadelphia, St. Louis and Boston Braves.

Boston, rated a 6-1 shot in the torrid pennant race, crashed into tie with Philadelphia by whipping Pittsburgh's last-place Pirates, 11-3 yesterday.

The Phillies split a double-header at Chicago, taking the nightcap, 8-3, behind Emory (Bubba) Church, after the Cubs swept to a 5-3 opening victory on Paul Minner's seven-hitter.

The St. Louis Cardinals, made it a three-way tie by beating Brooklyn Dodgers 5-3 in a night tilt at St. Louis.

Cincinnati's red-hot Reds shaded the New York Giants, 1-0, on Virgil Stalcup's third-inning homer. The Red Legs managed only two hits off Minner's seven-hitter. Howard Fox, who yielded seven blows, was the winner.

Boston's Warren Spahn mastered the Pirates for the first time this season, spacing six hits. Walker Cooper topped the Braves' 14-hit attack with a three-run homer in the second.

The Braves, 1948 kinsmen, made it 9-1 in a wild fourth, scoring five unearned runs as the Pittsburgh infield fell apart. Starter Murray Dickson suffered his 10th loss.

Ellis Serrano backed Minner's fine hurling with two homers in the opener at Chicago. The Cubs gathered 14 hits off loser Robin Roberts and Ken Johnson.

Church checked the Chicagoans on five hits in the nightcap. He lost his shutout in the sixth, when big Hank Sauer clubbed a three-run homer.

At St. Louis, the Cardinals turned the tables on the Dodgers, taking an early lead and the decision behind the seven-hit pitching of Al Brazle.

Johnny Mize slammed two home runs and two singles, driving home four runs to lead the New York Yankees to a 12-1 American League romp over the St. Louis Browns.

The New Yorkers smacked two old mates—Don Johnson and Dick Starr—for 18 hits. Gene Woodling also hit a homer for the champs—a three-run, inside-the-park job in the sixth—help Tommy Byrne coast to win no. 10. The erratic left hander fanned eight, walked two.

Forced out of action with a hand injury, Bob Lemon nevertheless received credit for his 14th pitching triumph as Cleveland trounced Philadelphia 10-2.

Lemon was struck on his pitching hand by a line drive through the box from rookie shortstop Kermit Wahl's bat in the seventh inning. The injury was not serious.

Washington jammed all of its six hits into the first two innings.
