Tasse with selling La Minerve to the Orangemen.

A THRIVING TOWN.—The Times reports that building operations in Moncton this year will total up something like \$225,000—about twice as much as last year. Of this sum about \$100,000 is being spent in the extension of railway works, \$25,000 for a new school-house, and the balance for the enlargement of the sugar refinery, and other improvements.

MOLASSES ACTIVE.—The St. John Sun says: There is at present an active demand for molasses in this market, and the stocks are rather light for this time of the year. The demand has just finished discharging 3000 hhd. from the brig, Edmond, and about 200 of those were sold from the wharf.

MONTRÉAL'S CARNIVAL.—There will be no regular winter carnival at Montréal this year; but, instead, the Tuque Bleu Snow Shoe Club—the pioneers of that pastime—will celebrate its fiftieth anniversary. The celebration, which will begin on the 4th February, and will be concluded on the 9th, will embrace the illumination of toboggan slides, Montréal snow shoe races, including a ladies' race, open to the world, annual winter games of the Montréal amateur athletic association, and jubilee dinner at the Windsor.

MUSICAL.—Messrs. Miller Bros. of this city, music dealers, have recently supplied the Convents of Notre Dame and St. Joseph, of this city, with three very fine tone Heintzman pianos. The above class of pianos have been before the public for about forty years and have acquired an established reputation, being used very extensively at most of the public institutions, where good tone and lasting qualities are required.

ELECTRIC LIGHTING.—The cost of electric lighting in various towns and cities is as follows: Moncton, 30 lights, 33 cents nightly; Montréal, 900 lights, 40 cents nightly; Toronto, 62½ cents, third class; Québec, 40 cents, water power provided free; Ottawa, 23 cents, water power free; Halifax, 21½ cents, 3rd class of 1200 candles and low tension; Winnipeg, 75 cents; St. Catharines, 40 cents; Peterborough, \$1.20 per pole yearly; Hamilton, \$1.15 per pole yearly.

ISLAND TRADE.—A Shediac correspondent writes to the Moncton Times: The shipments of Island produce are very large this year, but one noticeable feature of the trade is the increasing proportion for points in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. This year fully two thirds of all the Island produce brought over here has been for points within the provinces. Formerly all the horses went to the States; this year one-third of nearly all the Island horses remained in the provinces, a great many going to Amherst and other parts of Nova Scotia.

THE LYCEUM.—"Jessie Vere," an English drama of much pathos and sentiment, was performed by the Boston Comedy Co. last night, to a very good house. The play gave great pleasure to the audience, who were delighted with the skillful manner with which the members of the company handled their parts. Miss Grey's Jessie was sweet and charming, and Messrs. Mills, Benn, Marsal, Noble, Carroll and Webster, and Misses Clifton and Mather and Little Pearl Clifton were all that could be desired. To-night, for the first time in our city, the "Loncheste Lass" will be played.

MONTRÉAL'S SHIPPING TRADE.—Navigation is practically closed at Montréal, says a dispatch of the 20th. There has been a slight falling off in the number of steamships this season, but their tonnage is the highest on record. Sailing vessels increased slightly in number but the tonnage was less. The cattle exported have increased to 85,537 from 61,003 last year, and the exports of sheep number 38,577 against 46,223 last year. A singular fact is that river vessels have brought down almost exclusively American grain, which is more and more closing this route while the Canadian grain goes by rail.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Brazilian Affairs.

BERLIN, Nov. 22.

It is stated as not impossible that an attempt will be made to secure the independence of the 200,000 Germans in Southern Brazil. Several of the powers will send troops to Rio Janeiro to protect subjects. The Brazilian parliament will meet early in December to choose a president.

RIO JANEIRO, Nov. 22.

All the pensions granted by the imperial government have been confirmed by the provisional government. An order has been issued that they be paid out of the revenues. The greater number of the officials who served under the Emperor have announced their allegiance to the new government. An ovation was given the ministers in Uruguay and the Argentine Republic last night upon their recognition of the republic.

The Proposition Rejected.

OTTAWA, Nov. 22.

A Conservative evening paper states that Sir Donald Smith and Mr. Van Horne visited Ottawa yesterday and interviewed Sir John Macdonald, to ask that the C.P.R. be given control of that section of the Intercolonial Railway between St. John and Halifax, the company undertaking to make alterations in their service for the benefit of Halifax. Sir John declined to entertain the proposition, remarking that while the idea might send the C.P.R. to Halifax, it would send the Conservative party to a much worse place. It is stated that the Government refused, on a former occasion, to accept the proposition now submitted by the C.P.R., because of Sir Donald Smith's withdrawal from the ocean steamship scheme.

They Are Satisfied.

PARIS, Nov. 22.

The Herald's European edition says that moderate republicans are satisfied with the ministerial declaration of M. Tirard and his cabinet for having expressed a determination to have nothing to do with "irritating questions" by which is meant doubtfully the separation of church and state constitutional revision and other salient planks in the radical platform. It is stated that the recent elections have convinced the Comte de Paris of the uselessness of any attempt under present circumstances for a monarchical restoration.

Another Revolution Reported.

LONDON, Nov. 22.

Persistent rumors were afloat in London to-day that a revolution was in progress in the island of Cuba. Despatches from Paris report that the same rumors are current there. It is impossible to trace the rumors to any definite source. The strict censorship of the news despatches at Havana renders it possible for a revolutionary movement to get under way in the island before definite intelligence can reach the outside world. The rumors are not credited.

What an Examination Showed.

YARMOUTH, N. S., Nov. 22.

The wrecked schr. Annie G., towed in here capsize, was turned over to-day and taken to a wharf. Appearances indicate that she was run down by some other vessel instead of having been on the rocks. The bottom is uninjured, but the upper forward part of the bow is gone, and the masts and rigging not cut away, as was supposed. The cabin is intact, but the galley is gone. No bodies were to be found about her.

Not a Warlike Utterances.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 22.

The czar visited the artillery school yesterday. He spoke of the distinction of Russian artillery on the battlefield in the past and said he hoped the occasion would not soon arrive to test it in the future, adding "May the Lord preserve us from that heavy trial."

To be Sworn In.

OTTAWA, Nov. 22.

Mr. Colby, M. P. for Stanstead, arrived here to-day. He will likely be sworn in as Cabinet Minister next week.
