### DRY BREAD AND POTATOES.

#### Shocking Cruelty to a Boy Who Was Working for His Uncle.

PARRY SOUND, Ont., Feb 25. —A shocking case was presented before Judge McCurry here recently. It was a charge of cruelty to an orphan boy who lived with a family named Stacey, near Sundridge. Freddy Stacey, the boy, about 12 years of age, lived with his uncle, John Stacey, on a farm, and was made to do work around the place. The evidence revealed the fact that the boy was starved almost to the point of death. He became literally a living skeleton. Gonorrhoe had set in his fingers and toes, from the effects of which he will suffer for life, having lost some of his toes at the Sundridge. When Dr. Carmichael of Sundridge was finally called in he found the boy unconscious, and in a dreadfully emaciated condition. No other restorative than food was administered, and by good treatment and a liberal diet during the last month the boy is fully restored, except from the effects of the gonorrhoeal sore, which still affects his hands and feet.

The lad stated that he got nothing else to eat than one or two potatoes and a small amount of dry bread. At one time he fed on raw peas, oats and chop stuff that he got from the barn, and sometimes raw turnips. For a time he managed to steal eggs from the poultry house. He ran away once, but was brought back.

The case is certainly one which for utter heartlessness is hard to parallel. Stacey was sentenced to six months' imprisonment and his wife was made to enter into a bond of two hundred dollars to appear later on for sentence, presumably to be given when her husband is liberated.

#### Pisquid Notes.

The hauling of marsh hay, fence poles, and the laying in of fuel for the summer months is the chief occupation of the male portion of the population of this district at present.

The smelt fishing which proved fairly profitable to the young men engaged in it, will soon be at an end as the close season is at hand.

POKER JOE.

—The Toronto Mail and Empire sums up the federal financial statement as follows: The Ottawa government has just borrowed \$2,500,000 in London in order to carry on its huge spending operation. A great jump has been made in the outlays during the past seven months. In 1895-6 we spent \$19,499,000 between July 1 and January 31; but in 1898-9, for the same period, the expenditure was \$21,352,000, almost two millions more. At the same time there has been a 20 per cent increase in the taxation. We, therefore, have the following results:

Increased taxation.....	\$1,853,000
Increased taxes.....	3,503,000
Temporary loan, 1899.....	2,500,000

—A scientific investigation of the physical strength of Chicago school children is to be undertaken by the Board of Education of that city, and the results which they obtain will be used as a standard for the treatment of pupils as to their capacity for mental endurance and physical exercise. It is thought that the results would be very important and serve to revolutionize the methods which are now in vogue. The theory or the test is to determine what is known as the "fatigue period" of a child, or that period of its life at which its energies are at the weakest, and, therefore, the time when its school work should not be pressed. The scheme will be put in operation at one of the largest elementary schools, in which at least one thousand children are taught. The pupils will be weighed and measured and will be examined, for the purpose of determining their physical condition. A test will then be made of the strength and endurance powers of the muscles of the child. This will be done by the special psychological instrument called the "ergograph," adapted for the purpose.

### ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

—Summerside Journal: There is great indignation over the manner in which the authorities will not do—or at least have not so far done—anything to improve the service. If our minister "with portfolio, Sir Louis H. Davies, is powerless in this matter, as he appears in many others, the Charlottetown Board of Trade and the business men of Summerside should take it up, and insist on a more prompt and satisfactory mail service than the present wretched arrangement affords.

Harper's Weekly: The brisk demand for college Presidents for use outside of their immediate calling has been illustrated recently in the appointment of President Angell as minister to Turkey, the nomination of President Low for Mayor of New York, and the effort to induce President Gorman to serve as a member of the War Investigating Commission. The newest example of it is the appointment of President Schurman of Cornell as president of the commission named by the President to go to the Philippine Islands, to investigate and consider the situation there and give advice as to what our government ought to do next. Cornell was pleased at Dr. Schurman's appointment, and on January 23 the university exchanged farewells with him at a crowded meeting. Dr. Schurman said he felt honored by the duty intrusted to him, but that he expected to be back in Ithaca to stay by the beginning of the next college year (October proximo). He said, something rashly, it would seem, "I shall never accept a foreign mission after my return from Manila." It may be fortunate for Harvard that her President is enough of a Democrat not to be readily available to help solve the problems of the present administration.
