

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. FRANK GALLANT

The death of Mrs. Frank Gallant occurred at the home of her son, John C. Gallant, Kinkora, on Tuesday morning, January 22, in her ninety-second year.

Mrs. Gallant, formerly Fannie Melver, daughter of John and Emily (Harrington) Melver of Newton was born on July 24, 1860. She received her primary education in Kinkora, afterwards attending Prince of Wales College. She taught school for several years in rural schools.

In 1890 she married Frank Gallant of Tignish where she lived till 1897 when they moved to Kinkora where she lived on a farm working long hours to help maintain and educate her family.

At the age of seventy-five she was stricken with the crippling disease of arthritis which compelled her to remain in bed for some years.

After the death of her husband in 1942 she went to live with her son John C. in Kinkora. Later being much improved she was able to help in many ways to care for her grandchildren who now mourn her passing.

A wonderful correspondent in her last years of life, she preserved her youthful spirit by her constant contact with friends at home and abroad, and her universal interests made her not only a very interesting conversationalist but a beloved friend to all.

About five weeks before her death she was again stricken by arthritis causing her to become bedfast. She gradually grew weaker till God called her. She was frequently visited by her pastor Father McQuaid who administered to her the last sacraments of the Catholic Church.

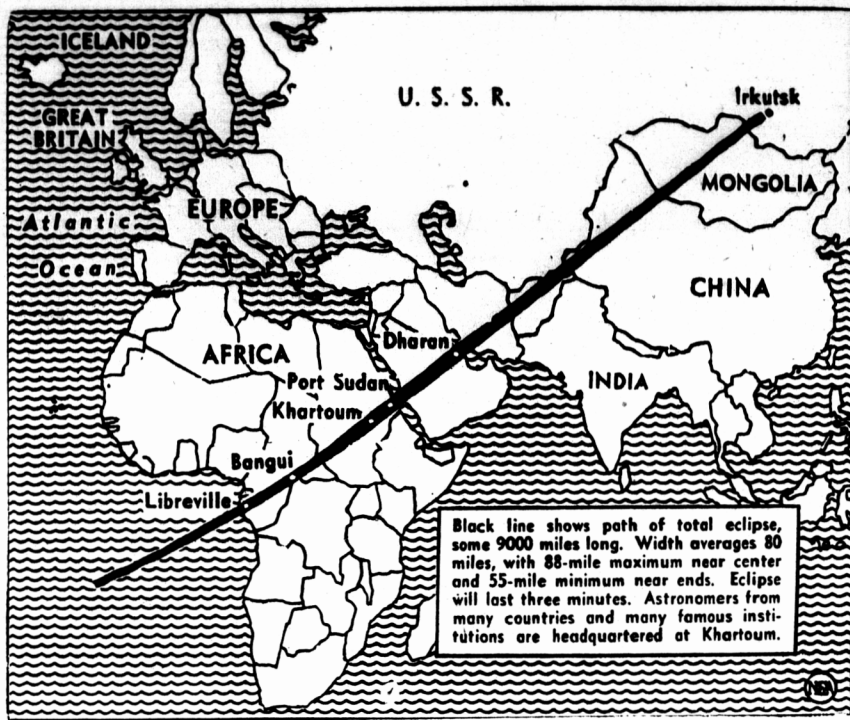

ANSWER: If your would-be boy friend is interested only in kissing and not in taking you out, he's not a very reliable person for an escort. Describe the situation to your mother, as you did to me, and abide by her advice. There's no reason for you to be afraid of her. Even though mom's decisions may not always be in accordance with your desires, remember she has your best interests and future at heart, and is only acting as she thinks right for you. So much trouble would be avoided if girls only had more confidence in their mothers—and mothers put a little more effort into winning it.

DEAR MISS DIX: I am a heartbroken mother. A year ago I inherited a small sum of money. My son, who is married and has a family, has completely disowned me as a mother because I didn't give it to him. I love my grandchildren dearly and am sick over the fact that they don't come to see me. I have always been good to my son and his family.

ANSWER: If your son is so money-mad that he would take this small pittance from you, you had better resign yourself to doing without him. Once he has the money, he'll have no further use for you anyway, and you'll have to shift alone—penniless.

It's a tragic thing when a child can be so cruel to a parent, and you can only pray that God will send him light to see the error of his ways.

DEAR MISS DIX: My 24-year-old sister is very much in love with a divorced man who has two children. Though the youngsters live with their mother, he supports them, and is not in a position to remarry and support a second wife. My parents are opposed to the marriage even if he should be able to support my sister. This affair is now much more serious than my parents suspect. Should I tell them?

ANSWER: Your parents are certainly justified in their objections. The insecurity which faces your sister if she becomes more involved with this man is no recommendation for marriage. Of course at 24 she should be old enough to know right from wrong, and act accordingly, but sometimes that wisdom is withheld from those much older than she. I doubt if your parents would have much influence on the girl, even if they knew the seriousness of the situation. Sometimes a sister can do more; why not talk to her yourself, and point out the danger in which she is placing herself?

Another MAGIC 'sure-fire' Success JAM UPSIDE-DOWN SHORTCAKES. Combine 1 lb. soft butter, 1/4 c. thick jam, 1 lb. lemon juice and, if desired, 1/2 c. broken nuts and divide between 6 greased individual baking dishes. Mix and sift twice, then sift into a bowl, 1 1/2 c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 1 1/4 c. once-sifted hard-wheat flour), 3 tps. Magic Baking Powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. grated nutmeg and 1/4 c. fine granulated sugar. Cut in finely 5 lbs. chilled shortening. Combine 1 well-beaten egg, 1/2 c. milk and 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Make a well in dry ingredients and add liquids; mix lightly. Two-thirds fill prepared dishes with batter. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 375°, about 20 minutes. Turn out and serve hot with sauce or cream. Yield—6 serves.

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
