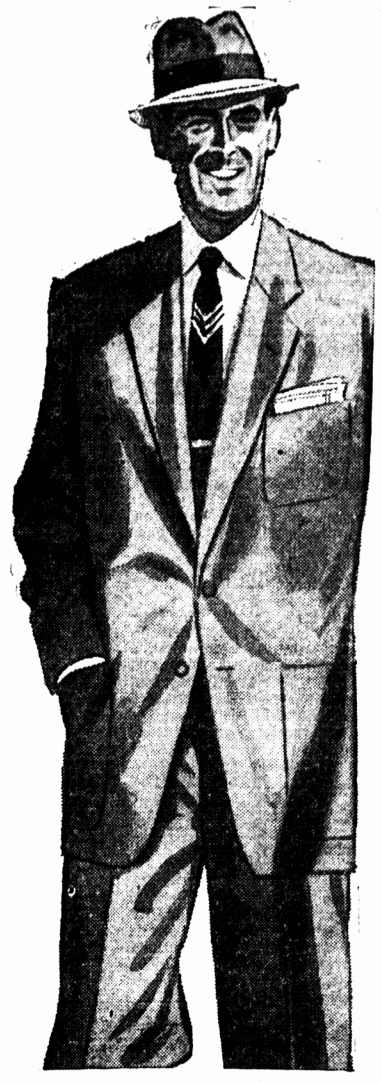

Doctors Discuss Thyroid Troubles

WINNIPEG, (CP)—The surgeon's knife is still the most potent weapon in cases of advanced thyroid conditions, including cancer.

A panel discussing thyroid disease at the Canadian Medical Association meeting agreed however that the use of iodized salt in the diet is one of the most effective methods of discouraging an enlarged thyroid gland, commonly known as simple goitre.

The four members of the panel were Dr. J. P. Gemmill, Dr. P. H. T. Thorikson, Dr. D. W. Penner, all of Winnipeg and Dr. Stewart G. Baxter of Montreal.

They said that since all the dangers of radio-active isotopes are not known, surgical treatment is the choice of doctors for most thyroid conditions.
