

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

A CORRECTION.—We note an error in the transmission of THE EXAMINER's telegram regarding the output of our cheese factories in the present year. The value ought to have been printed \$300,000 not \$30,000.

OVER FIFTY THOUSAND.—The subscriptions to the General Relief Fund, Windsor, are about \$36,000. Add to this amount \$10,000 from Halifax and \$5,000 from St. John, and the amount is \$51,400.—Windsor Tribune.

GOOD WORK.—Messrs. A. Murphy and Joseph Gallant did some good work horseshoeing on the two first days of this week. On Monday they shod 40 horses and on Tuesday 31. The work was performed in Mr. Murphy's forge on Kent Street.

A SAD DEATH.—Mr. Robert Forest, a well-known farmer of Grafton, Queen's County, N. S., is dead. One day last week Mr. Forest was working on his burnt land and drank some water that had been in a copper kettle for some days. He was taken ill and a doctor was summoned when it was found that he had been poisoned by the water and all efforts to save his life failed. He leaves a large family.

CHILDREN'S DAY.—To-morrow will be children's day in the First Methodist Church. In the morning the Rev. Mr. Dawson, of Cornwall, will preach, addressing especially the parents and children. At 2.30, p. m. the children will assemble in the lecture room and at 3 o'clock proceed to the church where an excellent programme, suitable to the occasion will be rendered by the school. An interesting feature of the programme will be Mr. Dawson's address to the children. The Sunday school offering for the poor will be taken at this service, and all the friends of the church are cordially invited to attend. The pastor will preach in the evening.

SPECIAL MEETINGS.—Major Pagnire, Provincial Officer of the Salvation Army forces in the Maritime Provinces and the Island of Bermuda assisted by Ensign Adams, will conduct three days special meetings in the Barracks on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, December 1st, 2nd and 3rd, at 8 p. m. The Major is a man with rare gifts, a good musician, plays a concertina in excellent style. He has a strong musical voice, and is a very powerful man on the platform. The people of Charlottetown have always given him a warm welcome. The self-denial scheme for P. E. Island will be launched by the Major during his visit. The effort comes off this year from December 5th to 12th. The amount raised last year was \$527. A portion was kept to help the poor of the city. The same will be done this year. The local corps is anxious to make the effort a good success.

PRICE WEBBER AT THE OPERA HOUSE.
