TORONTO, Aug. 11.
A special to the "Globe" says: Hon.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.
Official bulletin, 8.30 a. m.—The Presi-
dent passed an exceedingly good night,
sleeping sweetly with but few short breaks,
and awakening refreshed this morning at a
later hour than usual. At the morning
dressing, just completed, it was found that
the deeper parts of the wound had been
emptied spontaneously. The quantity of
pus secreted is beginning to diminish. Its
character and the appearance of the wound
are healthy. His temperature shows an
entire absence of fever this morning, and
his pulse, which is less frequent than yester-
day, is improving in quality. At present
pulse 100; temperature 98.6; respiration,
19. Signed.

ALBANY, Aug. 11.
The champion bicycle medal was won
here yesterday by Fred. Rollinson, of New
York.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 11.
J. C. Drake, a young Englishman, re-
cently from Kansas City, employed by
Turner, Fraser & Co., of St. Joseph, as
travelling collector, has disappeared with
a collection of \$17,000.

CHICAGO, Aug. 11.
The carpenters and joiners are still in
session. They propose to adopt a consti-
tution, the principal point of which is
provision for a fund to assist strikers, and
a section prescribing the method of inaugu-
rating of strikes. They will be known as
the "Brotherhood of Carpenters and Join-
ers of America."

BURTON, Mo., Aug. 11.
Yesterday a man named Jackson insulted
a lady named Langford. Her husband found
Jackson and attempted to chastise him,
but was fatally stabbed by Jackson. Mrs.
Langford appeared and fatally shot Jack-
son, but before he fell he cut her slightly.

FRANKFORT, Aug. 11.
The association for the reform and codi-
fication of International Law will hold a
congress at Cologne, beginning on the 16th
instant. Delegates are expected from the
European countries and the United States.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11, 7 p. m.
After the noon bulletin was issued the
President's condition continued as then
reported until about 4 p. m., when the
commencement of the noon fever was
noted. In its degree it did not differ ma-
terially from that of yesterday. His pulse
is now 108, temperature 101.2, respira-
tion 19.

The Assistant Secretary of State sent the
following telegram to Minister Lowell at 9
this evening:—The President's condition
and progress continues substantially the
same this evening as yesterday.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Aug. 11.
The Times says it has been arranged that
the House of Lords to-morrow will recon-
sider the Land Bill after leaving the Com-
mons, and the bill will be returned to the
Commons with the final amendments of the
Lords on Saturday. Lord Salisbury has
issued a whip to Conservative peers invit-
ing them to be ready to consider the Land
bill as amended by the Commons. The
language of the whip implies that the Con-
servative peers may be called upon to op-
pose the action of the Commons in re-
jecting more important amendments of the
Lords.

The Standard says if the Lords decline to
acquiesce in the rejection of their amend-
ments to the Land Bill by the Commons,
an unofficial conference will probably take
place between the Liberal and Conservative
leaders, and if this fails, recourse will be
had to the machinery of a conference.

The police have discovered a gang of

twenty lire pieces.

PARIS, Aug. 11.
The inauguration of the International
Electrical Exhibition here yesterday was
private. The view exhibition is in a very
unready state.

Berlin, Aug. 11.
The Emperor William has arrived at
Potsdam. Important Cabinet conferences
will take place immediately to hasten the
understanding between the Vatican and the
Government.

PARIS, Aug. 11.
President Grevy yesterday inaugurated
the International Electrical Exhibition,
after which he visited various exhibits.

LONDON, Aug. 11.
The Vienna crew beat Cornell.

LATER.
VIENNA, Aug. 11.
The boat race between the Cornell Uni-
versity crew and an Austrian crew, selected
from four rowing clubs of Vienna, was
rowed on the Danube to-day. The course
was a mile and a half against the stream,
round buoys and back to the starting post.
The Cornell crew had a four lengths lead
of the Austrian crew early in the race,
but they appeared exhausted when they
reached the point in the course known as

The Mysterious Convention.

ANOTHER SPLIT IN THE CAMP—THE INFERNAL
MACHINES.

CHICAGO, August 9.—The wrangling
amongst the Irish delegates to the Clan-na-
Gael Council in the Palmer House, took a
new turn at the evening session, and was
centered in the Fenian committee. It went
so far that the president and temporary
secretary resigned. In their places were
elected Edward O'Meara chairman, and
William Hoare, of Massachusetts, secre-
tary. Captain McKay, of Philadelphia,
made a long conciliatory speech, intended
to bring about peace between the factions,
and for a time with good effect, but it was
all lost when some terrible looking and
deadly dynamite machines were brought in
for exhibition by the extremists, and the
whole discussion, from which Satur-
day's and to-day's troubles arose
from, was re-opened. Crowe who
was the author of the Peoria sensation,
was present, and spoke in favor of the in-
fernal machines. Haynes, O'Brien and
others expressed themselves as disgusted at
the murderous turn affairs had taken, and
with their adherents, got up and left
the room, declaring their intention of
withdrawing entirely from the Convention.
They declared that such weapons or such
means of warfare should never be used in
cause or have the endorsement of Irish
agitators. These withdrawals were so
numerous as to leave the Council in con-
trol of the followers of O'Donovan Rossa,
who were jubilant and jeered at the depart-
ing delegates. The majority then caused
telegrams to be sent immediately to O'Don-
ovan Rossa at New York, and James
Kenrick, of Providence, inviting them
to come immediately to Chicago, and
advise with the Council. Both replied
that they would come on at once. As soon
as the clerks at the Palmer House learned
that there were infernal machines in the
building, they began a search for them,
announcing that they would continue the
search until they were found, and when
found they would confiscate them and
remove them from the house. The
goings of the convention that they are
showing some excitement as well as the
servants, among whom the excitement is
intense. The Wolfe Tone bolters have
held another meeting, at which much feel-
ing was displayed over the resolution of
the original convention requiring them to
take a new oath. The discussion is said to
have been an angry one but there was no
difference of opinion among the delegates
present and they unanimously refused to re-
enter the council upon the terms offered.
The statement concerning the position of
West, of Providence, R. I., charges against
whom have been investigated, are conflict-
ing; the latest and apparently most trust-
worthy of reports is, however, to the effect
that he has been requested to hand in his
resignation and has refused to do so.

A Strange Canadian Religion.

(Hudsonville, Mass., Forester.)
In April last Wesley Wells, a lad aged
20 years—a new arrival from Scarborough,
Ont.—began to hold religious meetings in
a private house in East Chaffey. As the
interest grew, he told the people that when
they felt that they were condemned by the
influence of the Holy Spirit this feeling was
an account of the ribbons, flounces, and
jewelry worn by them. If they did not
take off these they would go to hell
right away. When the people were well
excited, Wells introduced a stranger, one
Sage, as the proper one to administer com-
munion. When Sage came the excite-
ment was at its height. The neophytes,
when called upon one after another would
rise, shout, roar, slap their hands, stamp
their feet, and fall prostrate as if in a fit.
On recovering from the fits some of the
converts would tell of seeing angels, and
even the Saviour. As meetings progressed
they were held almost nightly—the excited
hearers were continually enjoined to give
up their jewelry, etc. The speaker himself,
after mildly gesticulating one evening, fell
on the floor, pawed around like a dying
alligator, and after a time he regained his
feet and a part of his senses. He told the
converts if they only saw all he had seen
and felt, they would give the world to en-
joy it. Some ladies took off their wedding
rings and gave them up, although enjoined
by their husbands not to do so.

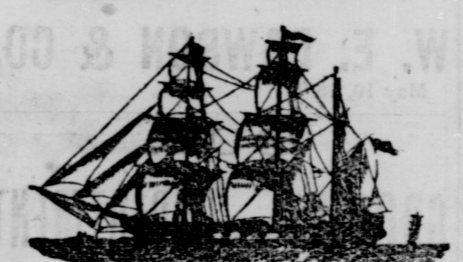

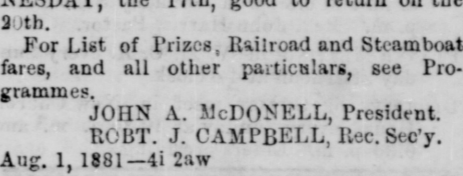
