

# Daily Transcontinental Service Will Be Started May 4 By CPA

TORONTO.—Canadian Pacific Airlines marks another milestone in its 17 years of operation with the inauguration of daily transcontinental service commencing May 4, which will introduce Canada's fastest air service between Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver.

In addition to CPA's jet-prop Bristol Britannia aircraft cutting the existing flying time from Toronto to Vancouver by one hour, 15 minutes, it will also enable tourist class passengers to enjoy the luxury of this new concept in air travel.

The 400-mile-an-hour Britannias will carry 89 passengers, 51 tourist and 38 first-class passengers. Actual flying times for this long-range jet-prop, destined to be the largest and fastest commercial aircraft in Canadian service will be: Toronto-Montreal, one hour, 15 minutes; Winnipeg-Toronto, two hours, 55 minutes; Vancouver-Winnipeg, three hours, 25 minutes.

CPA will make 623 seats available Eastbound from Vancouver every week, and a similar number Westbound from Montreal; Winnipeg and Toronto will share

the same 613-seat capacity in both directions.

Canadian Pacific's international flights between Hong Kong, Tokyo and Vancouver on the West coast, and between Montreal, Lisbon and Madrid on the East coast, will connect with the new mainline daily service across Canada.

**ABOUT THE BRITANNIA**

A new high standard of air travel is inherent in the remarkable flight characteristics of the Bristol Britannia of quiet, vibration-free flight of turbine power while retaining the long-range flight features of propeller operation.

With its ability to cruise up to 5,000 miles without refueling, the Britannia passengers enjoy the comfort of an air-conditioned living room while flying through the frigid and rarified atmosphere while cruising four miles or more above the earth.

On its cross-Canada flights, the Britannia will be guided securely to its destination by the most modern flight navigation and communication equipment. Within its spacious fuselage is housed nearly seven tons of electronic and electrical devices which include eleven radio receivers and

six radio transmitters as well as automatic pilot radar.

The automatic pilot is advanced on the Britannia that it can bring the airplane right down the approach path to the end of the runway under fully automatic control. This permits the captain to devote their complete attention to monitoring the flight and making the necessary judgments.

The radar installation is, in effect, a small TV screen in the cockpit, used primarily to detect and avoid turbulent storm clouds on the flight path. It can also be employed for "seeing" the terrain through radio stations on route.

The our great Bristol Proteus power plants are the most unique and the distinctive feature of the Britannia. Housed within a streamlined nacelle, each of these four jet-prop engines develops 4,000 horsepower for takeoff. This surge of power is compared with that of over six steam locomotives, or 90 automobiles.

At present CPA is operating a fleet of six of these model 314 long range Britannias. According to present plans, Canadian Pacific will be flying these aircraft on its entire 34,000-mile overseas route pattern as soon as possible, to become one of the first airlines in the world to serve all its international routes with turbine-powered aircraft.

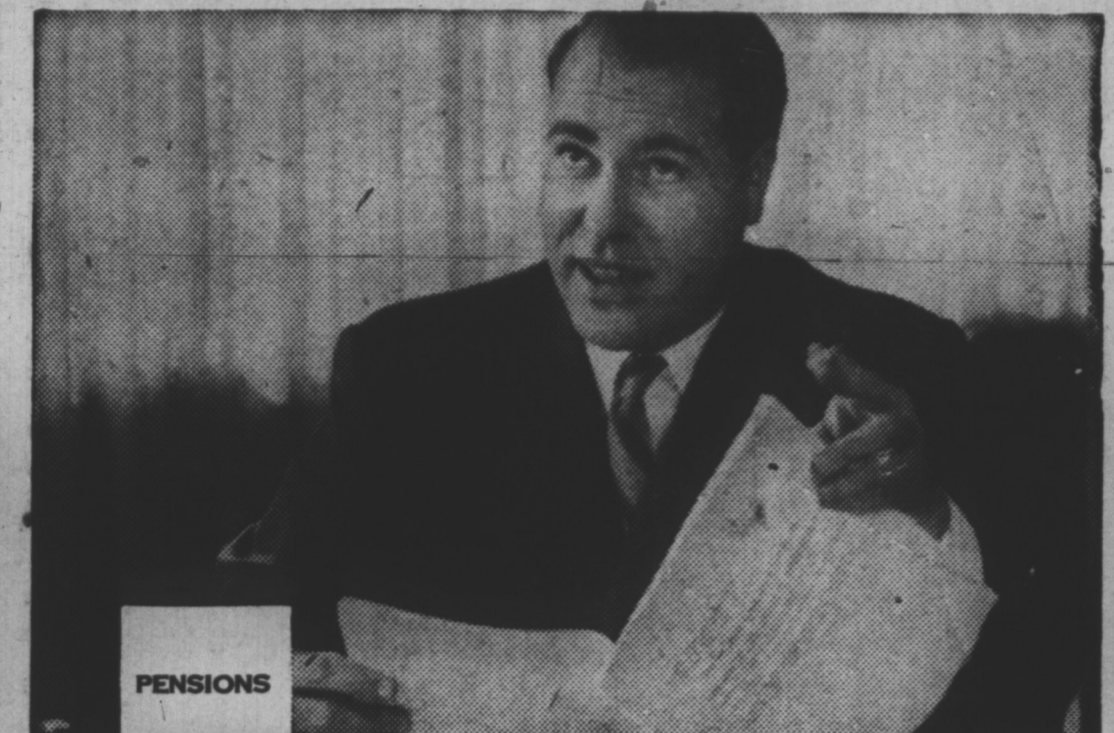
