NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Spring is said to be earlier in the Northwest than for twenty years. The weather is quite summer like and seeding well under way. Farmers are said to be going more extensively into mixed farming, but the indications are that the wheat acreage will show an increase. The Northwest seems to be all right. Mr. Shaw was speaking on the budget yesterday afternoon, and this forenoon, and is not yet through with his speech. His exposure of the Government's policy of extravagance is most thorough. He expected that he would conclude his speech last night, but when six o'clock arrived the Speaker, in accordance with instructions received, adjourned the House until ten o'clock this forenoon. In this way Mr. Shaw was choked off, and the large number of electors who are unable to attend the day sessions were deprived of the privilege of hearing what he had to say. Competition in trade leads to queerer things. An association of merchants in St. Louis is offering free transportation to merchants in various States who visit that city and buy \$1,000 worth of goods, and Chicago jobbers have not this move promptly by offering prominent merchants an invitation to visit Chicago at the expense of the Chicago Merchants Association, whether they buy anything or not. This is encouraging. But after all, as an exchange says, the best way for a great commercial center to attract customers is to offer the best goods at the lowest prices. This is the course pursued by Charlotteville.

The Patriot publishes Sir Hilbert Tupper's contradiction of its telegram of Saturday respecting what he said at Antigonish. In so doing, however, our contemporary asserts that Sir Hilbert only makes the case worse, and intimates that when he asked Catholics and Protestants to vote for Canada's good faith and to stand by the Government in maintaining the constitution against bigamy anywhere and everywhere, he will say something that was uncalculated and unnecessary. But the expression, "bigamy anywhere and everywhere" may fairly be applied to the present situation. On the one hand we have the Montreal Witness, Protestant Grit organ, declaring that the Government is "playing in the hands of the Roman Catholic hierarchy," while the Elector, French Grit organ, declares that the Government has "succumbed to the demands of the Orangemen." When these different elements are at work against the Government, it is certainly in order for Sir Hilbert to ask the electors to uphold the Government in its constitutional course.

A New England newspaper speaks of the proposed union of "Little Newfoundland" with Canada. But, as the St. John Sun points out, Newfoundland is not quite so little as this editor thinks. The island is more than two thirds as large as all the New England States, and exceeds in area Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New Hampshire and Vermont put together. With Newfoundland goes Labrador, with an area of 120,000 square miles. Newfoundland and Labrador together are equal in size to the New England States, with New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey thrown in. It may appear at present that Labrador does not amount to much as a possession. As yet, however, very little is known about it, except that it has valuable fisheries. It seems certain that there are good timber lands in the interior, and it is not improbable that Labrador has great mineral wealth. The time was when Alaska was hardly thought of as worth taking. But now it is one of the most valuable possessions of the republic. Newfoundland may not at present be in funds. But she is not rich and is not without great national wealth.

The country was opposed to taxes as levied by the Davies Government, and the late Government took the tax off as soon as they were in a position to do so. If they had a deficit, they believed it could be paid by means of the money received from the Dominion Government in payment of the claims of the Province, the present Government should practice economy. The people are far from being pleased with the manner in which they are managing affairs, and do not take kindly to the system of taxing which they have imposed. In consequence, Mr. Macdonald expressed the hope that the Government would conduct affairs economically, and that something would be done for the people in the way of relieving them from the burden of taxation under which they were now laboring.

Mr. Macdonald said that in rising to pass a few remarks on the subject now before the House, he would at first set that it was not his intention to institute a comparative statement of the different items of expenditure under the respective parties. He just wanted to call attention to the manner in which the present Government managed the business of the Province since they attained to power. As all are aware, the present Government took the reins of power about the 18th April, 1891, and they immediately proceeded to appoint a committee to investigate and report on the finances of the Province. They brought in their report on the 24th of April, 1891, and on the 24th of April, 1891, according to this report the liabilities of the Province on that date amounted to \$171,000 in round numbers. In this amount they included the unexpired portion of the half-year subsidy, viz: from the 24th April to the 30th June, an amount of \$33,000, which, in his opinion, was very unfair. He was, however, prepared to admit this statement, no matter how unfair it might be. In the session of 1891 the Leader of the Government introduced a debt-act. Meeting at Red Point. A meeting of the farmers of this vicinity was held on 2nd inst., in the Schoolhouse at Red Point, under the auspices of the Red Point Farm and Dairy Association, to discuss important matters of an agricultural nature. Cyrus Stewart, Esq., was appointed Chairman, and the undersigned Secretary.

The first called upon was T. S. Robertson, Esq., who after a few preliminary remarks, read a paper on the "Renovation of the Soil." Mr. Robertson, whose paper was beyond criticism, is a practical farmer and seemed to understand thoroughly the subject of which he was speaking. He conveyed to the audience many valuable hints, on the management of the soil, and the treatment of certain fertilizers, so as to obtain the most beneficial results. A plain, straightforward manner, Mr. Ronald McAulay, recounted his personal experience in dairying, dwelling principally on the advantages of the cooperative system. Having finished his discourse, he satisfactorily answered all of the many questions proposed by those most interested. Mr. A. Mooney promptly responded to a call from the chairman, and having endorsed the sentiments of Mr. McAulay and Robertson, spoke at some length on the silo, proving conclusively that the silo is an essential factor of successful dairying. Mr. J. E. Robertson, in the course of a brilliant speech, touched on some points which if put in practice, would contribute much to the success of the farming community. He was followed by Mr. John McLean and others, who all spoke in the same way that the farmers to better their condition, must give up the old, and adopt the new system of dairying and mixed farming. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered Messrs. McAulay and Mooney, both of whom are energetic members of the Gowan Brae Dairying Company, for their instructive addresses.
