Capital Investments

In his speech, Mr. Drew took issue with a statement by Mr. J. Goldwell, CCF leader, that the Progressive Conservative party was promising tax cuts at the same time it proposed to undertake developments which could cost \$2,000,000,000.

Large Force Needed

In a country like Canada, the need was for a "large, powerful and mobile air force" for both home defence and overseas commitments. Statements that defence forces would be reduced under a Progressive Conservative government were "definitely not true."

Conservative Leader Speaks On Federal Issues In S'side

Hon. George Drew said in Summerside yesterday that a Progressive Conservative government would make Canada's air defences "more effective" by more efficient use of the defence budget.

In the first of two election campaign speeches on Prince Edward Island, Mr. Drew took issue with what he said were rumors being spread in the armed services that the \$500,000,000 annual tax cut promised in his party's election platform would mean a reduction in the armed forces.

"Far from reducing our armed forces, we believe that for the money we are spending we should have more effective forces." Large savings could be made in the defence department by ending "waste and inefficiency."

"I respect the sincerity of the CCF leader, but I hope he will understand that these developments would not involve annual costs on a fraction of the scale mentioned by him."

Mr. Drew referred to hydro-electric power developments undertaken in Ontario while he was Premier of that Province. Those hydro projects, he said, paid their own way and did not cost the taxpayers "a single cent."

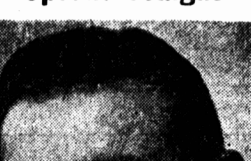

Year's Progress

The president noted in his report that the directors of the Co-op Services, in conjunction with the P.E.I. Credit Union League had investigated the possibility of amalgamating the two organizations. However, it was felt that the needs of both would be served best with two boards as at present, but with a reduction in the number of directors on the League board.

Amalgamation Proposal

"It was unfortunate from a cooperative point of view," he said "that three of our dairy co-operatives, Abram's Village, Grand River and Kensington saw fit to depart from the Co-operative Associations Act and join with other dairying companies to form, under a special act, the Amalgamated Dairies Ltd. However, if these farmers feel that they will benefit themselves and operate to better advantage under an act foreign to the Co-operative Associations Act, we wish them success."

Report Discussed

Discussion on the manager's report was spirited and engaged in by a good number of the delegates present. Mr. Leo MacIsaac felt that a finance programme should be set up, so that Co-op members could receive the benefit of credit buying without the high finance charges necessary in dealing with outside concerns.
