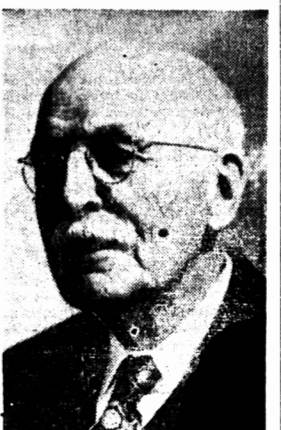
Mr. Kickham Gives Review Of Legislation Affecting King's

The following address by Mr. T. J. Kickham, M.P., for King's, evening in the "Report From Parliament Hill" series:

"Representing, as I do, a rural constituency, I shall address myself to subjects that largely concern the people of Prince Edward Island and King's County, whom I have had the pleasure and privilege to represent in the House of Commons at Ottawa for the past four years. "Now the time has arrived for representatives to give a review of their work for the information of the people. It is not enough for representatives to strive to do all possible for the constituencies they represent. The electorate ask to be informed just what has been accomplished in the past four years and the people are entitled to have this accounting in keeping with our democratic practices and procedure in government. Therefore, I shall briefly review Government legislation and other subjects.

War Veterans' Pensions "On War Veterans' legislation we have Pensions to disabled veterans; pensions under the War Veterans' Allowance Act; pensions to dependent of deceased veterans; pensions under other forms of legislation. "For war veterans and their dependents, I shall take the awards granted for one year only, ending March 31, 1953. "There are now in our Province, 1,499 disability pensioners and the amounts which they received last year was \$922,297.00 and for the same period dependents of deceased veterans, including widows, parents, brothers, sisters and children, of which there is a total of 334, received \$284,633.00, making a grand total of 1,833 recipients, receiving \$1,206,930.00. "These receiving War Veterans' Allowances for the same period, their number being 421, received \$314,209.00 and their dependents received \$54,971.00. Under the above named Acts, the veterans and their dependents in our Province, received a total amount of \$1,576,229.00 in the last year period. "Assistance to veterans is also granted through the Veterans' Benefit Act, covering in education and through the Veterans'

Land Act. That I will not discuss at this time. However, assistance granted to veterans and their dependents in Canada is on a high level, as compared to other countries, and they are entitled to all the assistance and recognition which they are now receiving and that our country can afford to grant to them.

Fishing Industry

"The fishing industry in our Province is receiving very great attention from the Federal and Provincial Governments and further legislation is now in the formative stage to give greater protection and security to the fishermen using small boats. One is an Insurance Plan designed to insure the fishermen's boats and fishing equipment against loss through storms, and the other plan is to extend to fishermen similar legislation as is granted to farmers through the Home Improvement Loan Act, thereby increasing the fishermen's borrowing capacities to provide themselves with boats and equipment. Much progress has been made in the past few years. Larger boats are being subsidized for their construction at \$165.00 per ton. "In King's County much that has been talked of some years ago has now become a reality. We have a fresh fish freezing and fishmeal processing plant in operation and, jointly with the Federal and Provincial Departments, for the first time in our Province, a slipway is to be constructed at Georgetown which will be large enough in the beginning to accommodate nine dragger boats. This slipway should prove of great advantage to the dragger fishermen, saving them the high union labor costs of having the boats serviced at union slipways on the mainland. "With the slipway within the Province, the fishermen can scrape and paint the hulls themselves and make any necessary repairs. "All in all, the future prospects for fishermen are very high.

Public Works

"The Federal Department of Public Works, in assistance to the fishermen and farmers, had in the past and is now spending large amounts of money on the construction of public works. "Continued on page 14
