Sir,—Her Majesty's Government being desirous of observing the strictest neutrality in the contest between Spain and the Republic of Chili, they propose, with the view of more effectually carrying into effect this principle, to interdict the Armed Ships and also the Privateers of both parties from carrying Prizes made by them into the ports, harbors, roadsteads or waters of the United Kingdom, or of any of Her Majesty's Colonies or Possessions abroad.

I have accordingly to acquaint you that the Queen has been pleased to direct that orders in conformity with the principles above stated, should forthwith be addressed to all proper authorities in the United Kingdom, and to Her Majesty's Naval or other authorities in all quarters beyond the United Kingdom, for their guidance in these circumstances.

A PROCLAMATION

BY HIS EXCELLENCY

WHEREAS a certain Treaty was made between Her Majesty and the United States of America, on the 5th day of June, 1854, providing for Reciprocal Trade:

And whereas the United States of America have, in accordance with the terms of the said Treaty, given notice for the termination thereof. And whereas in consequence of such notice the said Treaty will expire on the Seventeenth day of March, 1866.

And whereas under the said Treaty many persons, citizens of the United States of America, have invested moneys and fitted out Ships for the purpose of carrying on the (in-shore) Fisheries within the Territory of Prince Edward Island, under the said Treaty. And whereas they may be unaware that their right to carry on such in-shore Fisheries will end on the said 17th day of March, instant

And whereas it is desirable that due precaution be taken to prevent injury or loss to any of Her Majesty's subjects, or to the citizens of a State with which Her Majesty, the Queen of Great Britain, is happily in amity. Now, therefore, I have thought fit, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Executive Council of this Island, to issue this my Proclamation, and I do hereby caution and warn all persons, not subjects of Her Majesty, that after the 17th day of March, inst., no vessels owned and manned in the United States of America, can pursue the in-shore Fisheries without rendering themselves liable to the confiscation of their vessels, and such other penalties, pecuniary and personal, as are by law imposed.
