

# Bruins Grab Second Spot; Leafs, Wings Cop Wins

**BOSTON (AP)** — The battling Boston Bruins outkicked Montreal's powerful Canadiens from the opening face-off Sunday night in a 5-3 National Hockey League victory. Johnny Bucyk's pair of goals in the third period were the deciding margin.

Only the brilliant goaltending of Jacques Plante kept the Bruins from rolling up the point as they posted their fourth straight victory in a late bid to all down second place.

Plante kicked out 45 Boston shots while veteran Harry Lumley, capably filling in for the sidelined Don Simmons, had only 21 in Bruins' net.

Big Jean Beliveau scored twice, once on a breakaway, to tie the score in the second period. The goals were his 42nd and 43rd of the season and boosted his point total to 87.

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Bob Pulford's goal from 50 feet out with only two minutes to play gave Toronto Maple Leafs a 6-5 victory over New York Rangers Sunday night and kept alive Leafs' hopes for a berth in the National Hockey League playoffs.

It was the fourth straight defeat for the Rangers.

Toronto, in fifth place, now has 59 points to the fourth-place Rangers' 62.

As in their Saturday night clash in Toronto — which the Maple Leafs won 6-0, there were plenty of fistfights. A total of 60 minutes was served in penalties.

Pulford's winning goal overshadowed the three goal effort by his team mate, George Armstrong, which kept the Rangers always in the position of fighting from behind.

**THINGS HAVE** returned to normal in the town of Summerside. The Prince County capital went on a wild celebration spree last night Friday and we could find no good reason why such a celebration wasn't in order. Their Aces had just won the intermediate hockey championship of Prince Edward Island after a spine-tingling seven-game series with the favoured Parkdale Royals.

Today the wildly-enthusiastic Summerside fans are awaiting the series with Sackville Combines for the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island championship. This series, a best of three affair, opens Wednesday night at Mount Allison Gardens. The second game of the set is scheduled for Charlie Hogan's icehouse Friday, with the third, if necessary, slated for Sackville one week from tonight.

**WE DON'T SEE HOW** this Sackville club can cause the Windy Steele crew too much trouble. As far as we are concerned, we are certain the Aces have conquered the toughest opposition—Parkdale Royals. We definitely look for the Prince County lads to go all the way in this Maritime Intermediate hunt and we'll be mighty disappointed if they don't.

Aces' fans are expecting their 'darlings' to bring the Maritime crown to Summerside, and they can bet that Charlie Hogan will have another bumper house on Friday night and fans of the Aces are figuring that victory that night will make the Aces Maritime finalists. They think their Island champions will open this series with a triumph Wednesday night in Sackville.

We think so too.

**ACES WERE INTERESTED** in extending the series to a best-of-five but the Combines wouldn't buy the idea, so the original series, as laid down by the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association, stands. Perhaps, the Maritime final, also set for a best-of-three, can be extended if the Aces emerge as N.B.-P.E.I. champions.

These Aces have surely caught the fancy of Prince County fans and they'll stick with them now right to the bitter end. These fans can sense a Maritime championship and they are determined to play a part in obtaining this coveted crown.

So, Friday night we are looking for another jammed Civic Stadium and another opportunity for Summerside fans to stage a victory rally.

**THE SERIES** just concluded between Summerside and Charlottetown was one of the greatest ever staged in these parts. Fans indifferent to hockey all season long, soon caught on to the spirit of things, once the boys started to give them the kind of hockey they just couldn't resist. It started with about 1300 folks in Civic Stadium for the opener and gradually built up until that seventh game last Friday when 3438 paid customers sandwiched themselves into the Summerside rink.

It proved beyond any shadow of doubt that hockey is far from dead here on Prince Edward Island. Give hockey folks here the right brand of hockey, with some organization beyond it and they'll turn out in large numbers. After a season that did all but kill hockey here, the provincial finals came along and made folks forget most of the unhappy things that had gone before.

**WE SALUTE** both Aces and Royals for the great entertainment they dished up to the fans during those seven games. The series had just about everything and that's why the fans really loved it. They won't soon forget this series which we think has given a great deal for hockey around these parts.

For Summerside, it had the happiest ending they could possibly wish for. Could you improve on winning over Charlottetown before a crowded Summerside rink? The Aces, who weren't supposed to cause the star-studded Royals too much trouble, had really accomplished what many experts of the game said couldn't be done. It was the luckiest Friday the 13th Summerside hockey fans had ever known.

**ROYALS WERE** naturally as disappointed as Aces were happy. They hadn't expected this kind of opposition to be served up by Windy Steele. They had a 2-0 lead early in that first period Friday night and appeared headed for an easy victory. But a goal had shown the stuff they were made of and had bounced back off the floor to turn defeat into glorious victory.

There were two players on the Royals' lineup that had, however, showed all fans—and that included those rooting for Summerside—their best hockey around these parts. We refer to Frank Roper and Angie Carroll.

Angie was a terrific threat at all times and Friday night he scored all the Royals' markers. We've never seen Carroll to better advantage and he surely gave this series all that he had. He suffered a rib injury early in the second game but kept right on and finished the entire series. Angie showed Island fans the great hockey player he really is, and the fact that his team didn't win the championship doesn't take anything away from his great performance.

**FRANKIE ROPER** in the Charlottetown nets was superb. We agree with radio sportscaster Bob Schurman (and we don't always agree with Bob) that Frankie's goal tending during the recent series surpassed anything seen here during the days of an "major league hockey." Roper kept the Royals right in the series to that seventh game and it was tough for likeable Frankie to have to taste defeat.

As we see it, this series went the limit, because of Roper. He almost broke the hearts of those Aces who must have been wondering what you had to do to beat him. Had Frankie played mediocre hockey, then Charlie Hogan would never have had an opportunity to squeeze those 3438 people in last Friday. The series would have been over long before that.

The redoubt seems to improve with age.
