

# United Nations Begins Functions In Kitchen

Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO (CP) — The United Nations now functions in the kitchen.

Recently the women's section of Toronto United Nations Association held a three-day international cooking school — their painless way to teach Canadian housewives about food and customs of other countries.

The school, first venture of its kind in Canada, demonstrated to 14 countries and attracted more than 3,000 people. "It did more for international understanding," organizer Mrs. William Tucker said, "than a four-power conference."

Canada housewives and their husbands flocked to the displays to watch typical Russian, French, German, Japanese and Scandinavian dishes prepared on the platform.

## EXOTIC FOODS

They collected handfuls of menus listing recipes for some of the more exotic foods such as Russian Easter bread which requires 15 eggs and a pound of butter, or Japanese sukiyaki, a stew brewed over a burner right at the table. Japanese food caused most comment — especially when the audience watched raw fish strips being dunked into a spiced sauce. It's a delicacy in Japan.

Canadians learned that Russians and Germans are partial to rich heavy food, and that Germans skip dessert. Instead they pause in mid-afternoon for pastries and coffee. The artist involved in serving meals Japanese style was demonstrated. Setting of the meal is important, from the miniature floral centre piece to lacquered serving bowls.

## DON'T MIX FOOD

Unlike the Chinese, the Japanese don't mix their foods. Everything under the sun may appear on their tables at once but always in separate bowls.

From Japan came a recipe for salmon teriyaki. Ingredients include a pound of red salmon, 1/2 cup corn syrup, 1 cup soy sauce, 1/4 tsp. accent, 1 tsp. powdered ginger or grated fresh ginger. Slice salmon into 1/2-inch thickness. Soak in sauce made of rest of ingredients for a few hours. Arrange salmon on tinfoil and cook under broiler until browned. Turn over and cook other side, basting with sauce.

A rich Easter cottage pudding, Russian style, includes: 1 pound moist cottage cheese, 1 pound sweet butter, 1 pound granulated sugar, 1 cup 20-per-cent cream, 10 hard-boiled egg yolks, 3 tsp. vanilla extract, 1/2 tsp. salt.

Grate cottage cheese and egg yolks through a fine sieve. Cream butter, adding gradually cottage cheese, yolks, sugar and cream in small amounts until thoroughly mixed. Add vanilla and salt and mix thoroughly. Line strainer with
