



BUSINESS PREMISES COMPLETELY GUTTED BY FIRE

# Scarred Ruins Remain As Aftermath Of S'ide Fire

Only the fire scarred brick walls of the MacArthur Estate Building and the store of Brace McKay Co. Ltd. are left standing after Wednesday night's destructive fire which raged throughout the night from the time of its discovery at 2:15 a. m. into dawn of yesterday morning.

Firemen, tired and weary after many hours fighting the half million dollar fire, one of the worst in the history of the town, were on duty all day yesterday pouring water on the still smouldering ruins, while others patrolled the roped off area as spectators visited the scene to see the ruins.

Although the fire was considered to be under control by six o'clock yesterday morning, the firemen kept steady streams of water on the smouldering debris, and last night the clouds of steam were still rising from the accumulated wreckage.

The different tenants of the ruined building yesterday made plans for re-establishing in other locations.

The Insurance Firm of R. E. Ellis and Son had by noon started to move their scattered office equipment into the former Canadian Tire Store, opposite the Capital Theatre on Central Street, and expect to be in business with a minimum of delay.

IN SMALLMANS BLDG.  
The office of the Guardian-Pat-

riot is now located in the Smallman Building on the second floor, and teletype service with Charlottetown and the other offices in Alberton and Montague, was established by late afternoon.

Despite difficulties, the daily delivery of the Evening Patriot, carrying coverage of the fire, was conducted in Summerside, and 1500 papers were delivered yesterday afternoon to the Summerside residents.

The J and S Clothing Store Management said last night that they hope to be re-established soon in new quarters, and that negotiations are under way to complete this arrangement.

Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, Q. C., re-located his law office yesterday morning in the Willard MacDonald building.

Hon. E. P. Foley, M. L. A., said last night that it is his intention to re-open his drug store in another location, and that he hoped to complete arrangements for new quarters today.

Dr. MacMurdo, Dentist, said that his plans for the future are at present indefinite, and Dr. H. T. Colvin, Optometrist, could make no definite statement regarding his future plans.

The management of the firm of Brace McKay Co. Ltd. yesterday opened an office on Water Street next to the Sally Shop, and said no definite plans could be announced at present.

During the fire, the Guardian-Patriot office equipment and records were saved by courageous

assistance given to the staff members by many including Harry Matthews, Marshall Green, Don Arsenault, Dr. Alan Stewart, W. Chester S. MacDonald, and Constable Ralph Hardy.

The staff members are very grateful also to Dr. E. E. Parkman, and Reginald Pope Manager of the Regent Theatre, who most willingly made their premises available to protect the records and equipment over night and part of yesterday until the staff was able to move into their new office in the Smallman Building.

The fire was first discovered by Cst. Sigurd MacKinnon of the Summerside Police Department, who was on routine police patrol. The fire, whose origin is uncertain, spread rapidly with flames leaping high into the air, showering millions of sparks over a wide area.

Assistance of firemen and fire trucks from Charlottetown, R. C. A. F. Station, Summerside, and Kensington, was received following an appeal by town officials.

\$300,000 LOSS

The largest loss in the fire was the store and warehouse of Brace McKay Co. Ltd. with a stock of \$160,000.00 and an estimated total loss in excess of \$300,000.

This store employed 26 persons, and the manager is Mr. Claude Ives. A fire sprinkler system was being installed in this store, and was almost completed.

The other building, in which nine establishments were housed,

is owned by the MacArthur Estate (Mrs. Muriel MacArthur and her son, Creelman), and its loss value is estimated in excess of \$75,000.00.

The second largest merchandise loss was the Drug Store of Hon. E. P. Foley, whose loss was estimated in the vicinity of \$50,000.00.

Mr. Foley, well known throughout Prince Edward Island, had been in business on this site for 38 years.

The J and S. Clothing Store operated by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cameron had a loss estimated at \$30,000.00.

Altogether, 48 employees and management personnel were directly affected by the fire which destroyed the 10 stores and offices.

While the firemen fought the battle in below freezing temperature, Summerside firms including Rogers and Arnett, R. T. Holman Ltd., Andy's Restaurant, and Bernard's Bakery made coffee for the chilly firemen.

The intense heat from the burning buildings shattered plate glass windows in the Water Street and Summer Street establishments of R. T. Holman Limited, the Provincial Bank, the Bank of Nova Scotia, the Read Studio and Camera Shop, Chan's Restaurant, Boates Pharmacy, Sheen and MacInnis Shoe Store, Dr. E. E. Parkman, optometrist, Jimmie's Meat Market, Regent Theatre, Bell's Book Store.

## Recall A Fire 52 Years Ago

As Summerside began the clearing of the rubble of yesterday's disastrous fire many of the older citizens recall vividly the fire of 1906 which started in the freight shed and spread across the town where it finally burned itself out at the railway on the south side of Notre Dame Street. There were 155 buildings burned in this conflagration.

Among these were the Baptist Church, the Episcopal Church, the Christian Baptist Church, the Presbyterian Church, the Methodist Church and the Roman Catholic Church.

The fire levelled three of the town's banks, the high school, the eastern school and western school, the post office, the railway station, several hotels and boarding houses, Holman's store, the drill shed and many fine residences.

In 1916 Summerside was visited by another disastrous fire which started at Sinclair and Stewart's Ltd. The large brick building was lost as well as a number of other large business establishments.

# Declines Comment On Postal Rates For Papers, Periodicals

OTTAWA (CP) — Postmaster-General William Hamilton declined comment Friday on the suggestion of Auditor - General Watson Sellar that Parliament review regulations covering mailing rates on newspapers and periodicals.

Stanley Knowles (CCF—Winnipeg North Centre) asked in the Commons whether the government was considering introduction of legislation on the matter. Mr. Hamilton said he would want to examine the auditor-general's report at greater length before replying.

Finance Minister Fleming, in reply to A. M. Nicholson (CCF—Mackenzie), said all government departments are studying portions of the report affecting them. "Whatever is required to be done to remove irregularities, if any, that existed under the former government, will certainly be done," he said.

The report covered the last fiscal year up to March 31.

Mr. Sellar said in his report, tabled in the Commons Wednesday, that the section of the Post Office Act dealing with mailing rates on newspapers and periodicals is, "to a material degree, legislation of the 19th century."

EXCEEDS REVENUE  
Mr. Sellar said postal revenue from mailing of newspapers and periodicals currently averages about \$6,000,000 annually. The post office estimated the cost of handling these is about \$24,000,000.

Mr. Sellar added: "It has never been legislative policy to fix rates to result in a self-supporting service, the aim being to encourage the dissemination of news, with some categories of newspapers and periodicals charged lower rates than others."

"Whether the \$18,000,000 estimated difference between revenue and cost now benefits, in particular, the publisher, advertiser or subscriber is an imponderable."

SUGGESTS REVIEW  
"However, a review of the practices causes the view to be entertained that the text of section 11 of the Post Office Act covering newspapers and periodicals might usefully be re-examined due to changes that have taken over the years in publishing practices and in the fields of distribution and communication."
