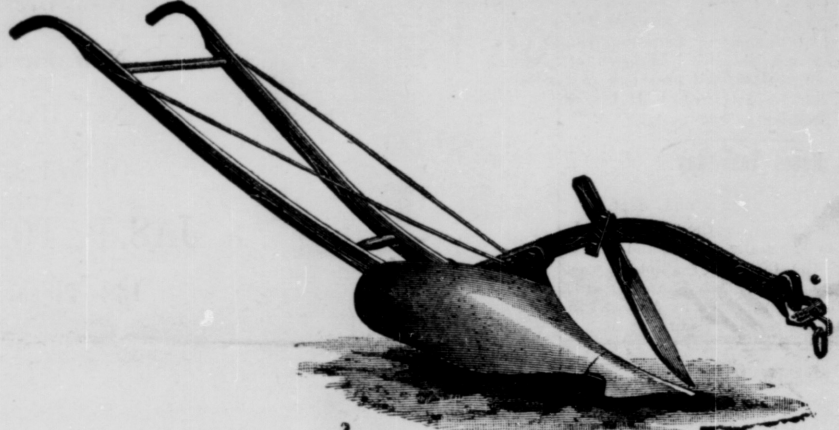

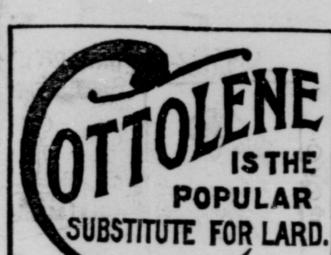

SALE OF P. E. ISLAND CHEESE.—The Montreal Herald recently had an interview with Professor Robertson, and says: "It will be remembered that last year a good deal of dissatisfaction was expressed because the cheese from Prince Edward Island was sold on private terms to a few exporters."

JUST LIKE A MAN.—Emma Coleman, 24 years of age, the good-looking daughter of a citizen of Danville, Ill., sold her right to her father's estate for \$1,200, went to Chicago, and is said to have entered a restaurant on Walsh Avenue in an intoxicated condition, mounted a chair and begun throwing bills about the place. She was arrested and had \$1,165 left.

—Hamilton Spectator: "The Manitoba farmer is in luck these days. The Canadian Pacific Railway has materially reduced the freight rates on lumber, and has knocked a cent a bushel off elevator charges on grain. Frost has not injured the crop. And Sir John Thompson, by sending to Manitoba a large supply of penitentiary made binder twine, has burst the corner in twine which was arranged by Sir Oliver Mowat's Central prison factory and the other twine makers in the province. The Canadian Pacific Railway and the Dominion Government have both proved themselves the friends of the Manitoba farmer."

THE PHYSICAL BASIS OF KNOWLEDGE.

The surface of the brain has many centers upon whose functions have been carefully studied. In addition to these centers, there are tracts of nerve matter connecting them with each other, so that an associated or concerted action of the brain centers becomes possible—indeed, is of constant occurrence.

It is these tracts or paths of nerve matter that enable the brain to build up our complex ideas. It will be seen from what has been said that the word "rose" carries with it many elements, such as color and shape, learned by experience through the eyes; taste, by the tongue; color, by the nose; weight by the hands.

In addition to the impressions reaching the brain through the nerves of hearing, sight, taste and olfaction, there is a constant stream of sensations pouring into the brain along the nerves of feeling. It has now been pretty well settled that some of the nerve fibers conduct sensations of heat and cold, some of pain and still others that sensation known as muscular effort, or the muscular sense. All these are carried to different parts of the brain and there registered.

From this registry they can be called up as a memory of past experiences. It will now be clear that there is a constant stream of sensory currents or sensations coming into the brain from all parts of our bodies. These sensations have their mental accompaniment. When a current escapes from the brain, and goes outward for the purpose of moving some muscle or group of muscles, there is also a mental accompaniment. It is in this way that we are aware of how we are acting and being acted upon. These constitute state of consciousness. The conscious personality, or conscious ego, is the sum of all the states of consciousness at one time existing.

In a moment, by disease or injury, a man may lose the power to speak, and yet be able to read and write or he may be unable to read and yet hear what is said. Some may have the capacity of hearing so damaged that the power for music is gone and still be sound in every other respect. Some, again, may lose the power of recalling things. They know them when written or printed; but they cannot speak, because they cannot recall the words needed to express their thoughts. Enough has been said to show that the brain and all the leading centers of it, and from it, are the physical basis of knowledge. Derangement in these is followed by derangement in the mental powers. Insanity is only disease affecting the brain so as to derange the thinking process, and all the actions of the person. This view of insanity has done much good, as it has led to a better method of dealing with insane people. The anatomical and physiological study of the brain shows that it is the organ of the mind; but further observations made in cases of disease and injury of the brain, as well as on cases of insanity, go to establish this doctrine beyond all dispute. Illusions, hallucinations, and delusions owe their origin to some derangement in the sense organs or in the perceptive centers in the brain. Following upon this, the conscious ego is no longer in its true relationship to its environments, and there is, as a consequence, derangement of conduct, as the result of the physical disease.

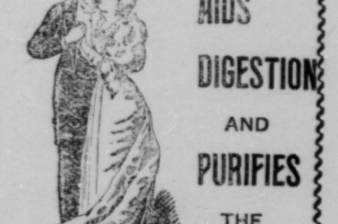
