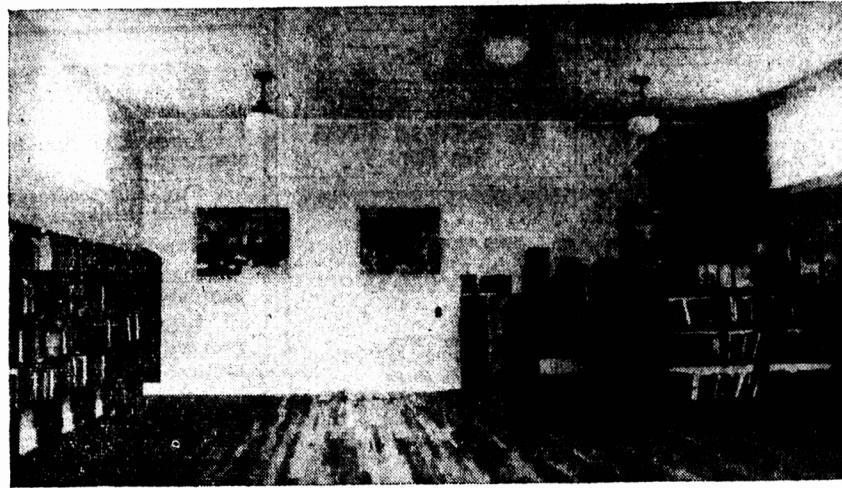
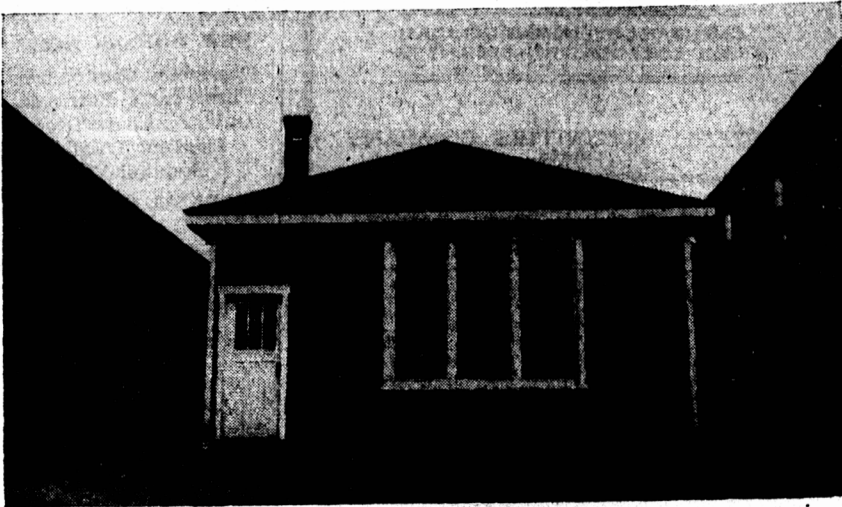

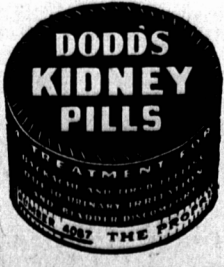

Shortage Of Dietitians Is Reported

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., June 12.—(CP)—A shortage of dietitians will highlight discussions at the Canadian Dietetic Association three-day convention this week. The Association's executive meeting here since Sunday, already has received a committee report that information for high school students, encouraging them to enter the profession, has been prepared. Some 300 dietitians from across Canada, together with distinguished food experts from the United States, will attend the sessions. On Thursday, Dr. Killian Gilberth of Monclair, N. J.—the mother in the book "Cheaper By The Dozen"—will deliver the first memorial lecture of the Violet Ryley-Kathleen Jeffs Foundation.

The foundation was formed in 1949 in memory of Miss Ryley and Miss Jeffs who pioneered in dietetics in this country. It proposes Monday evening, May 21st. 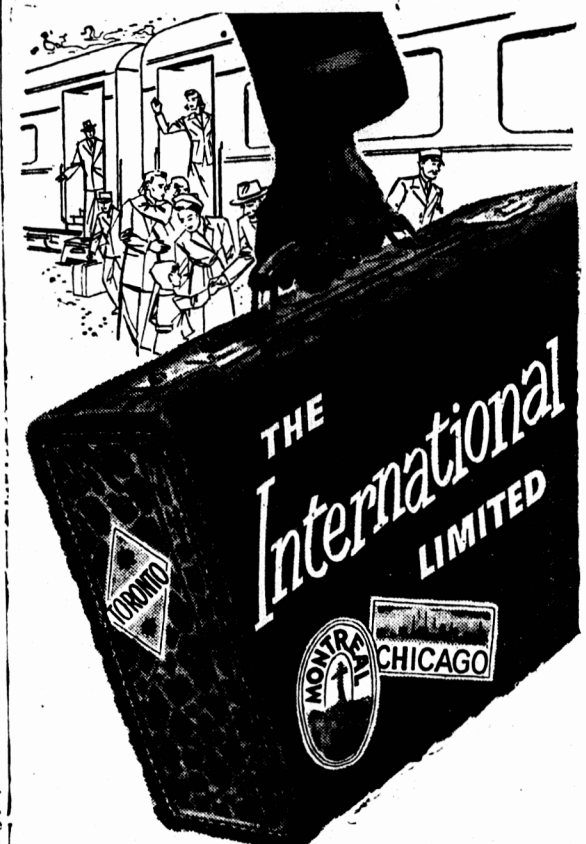
