NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL

The Spoils System in Operation.

Senator Ferguson Wants to Know Whether the Electioneering of Messrs. Warburton and White is Known to the Government.

OTTAWA, May 8.—The House of Commons went into committee of supply yesterday after a preliminary skirmish between Mr. Foster and Mr. Tarte. The Minister of Public Works had dismissed the lockmaster and his assistant in Ottawa county. This was done at the request of Mr. Bourassa, the sitting member, and the reason given was that the official referred to did not obey orders which were given him to consult with a certain local politician in the employment of help and the purchase of supplies. Mr. Tarte grew angry when the correspondence was read, and threatened to dismiss some more officials, whom he accused of giving out information.

On the Inland Revenue Department's estimate, Mr. Joly proposed to increase the salary of one clerk at a jump from \$500 to \$1,100.

Mr. Foster criticised this proceeding, and Mr. Joly, in a pet, moved to strike out the whole increase and leave this clerk where he was before.

The Senate has adjourned to next Wednesday. In that chamber Hon. Mr. Ferguson has given notice of a number of questions regarding the telegrams sent by Hon. Mr. Davies to persons in West Prince during the late bye-election campaign promising public works not mentioned in the estimates. He also wants to know if the Government is aware that James White, of Alberton, and A. B. Warburton, of Charlottetown, men in the pay of the Federal Government, have been taking a violent and active part in the recent bye-elections.

THE GREEK SITUATION.

Royalty in Perilous Position.

LONDON, May 8.—An Athens despatch says that the position of royalty there is now more perilous than ever. The members of the royal family rarely leave the palace and their portraits have been withdrawn from public view.

LONDON, May 6.—A despatch from Berlin says it is reported there that the powers have decided to land troops at Athens to protect the dynasty, Greece having declined the proffered mediation and Turkey being willing to negotiate on easy terms if Crete is evacuated by Greece.

ATHENS, May 6.—Austria and Germany have joined the other powers in proposing mediation between Greece and Turkey. The Greek forces are retreating slowly and in orderly fashion to Almyro, and Volo has been almost completely evacuated.

ATHENS, May 6.—A collective note will be handed to the Greek and Turkish governments this (Thursday) evening or tomorrow, calling upon them to cease hostilities on the distinct assurance that the powers will undertake the final solution of the pending difficulties.

LONDON, May 6.—A Vienna despatch says the King of Greece is in a precarious condition.

ATHENS, May 6.—The Greek fleet has captured at the entrance of the Gulf of Salonica a schooner in which Sir Ellis Ashmead Bartlett, English M. P., recently visited the Turks. It is reported that documents of a seriously compromising character have been found on the schooner.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 6.—The Turkish General has just telegraphed that he has taken Pharsalos after fifteen hours' engagement.

Colonel Longworth's Appointment.

OTTAWA, May 8.—Lieutenant Colonel Longworth, of the 4th Regiment G. A., P. E. Island, is among the staff selected by Mr. Laurier to accompany him to the Queen's Jubilee celebration in London.
