THE ROADWAY TO THE PARK. Successful Outcome of the Recent Visit to Ottawa.

It is pleasing to hear that as a result of the mission to Ottawa of His Worship Mayor Dawson and Councillor Nicholson a liberal grant is to be given the Roadway to the Park by the Dominion Government. His Worship and Councillor Nicholson, accompanied by Senator Ferguson, the representative of this Province in the Cabinet, had several interviews with the Ministers, and His Worship also had an interview with Sir Mackenzie Bowell at his residence, as on account of illness, he was not able to be in his office. By all they were received most courteously, and they left Ottawa well pleased with the result of their trip.

The delegates, we understand, explained to the Ministers that the ground in front of the Battery property at the Park was washing away at the rate of at least a foot a year, and that it was in the interests of the Government that they should build a breastwork to protect the property. They also explained that under the existing order of things the military, in order to reach the Battery, had to cross by a most circuitous route, west of the Battery, this would be obliterated and the route to the Battery from the Drill Shed lessened by about a mile.

In view of the fact that the Battery property was gradually washing away and that in consequence the property adjoining which belonged to the city was being affected, and in view of the distinct advantage to be gained by access to the Battery being rendered more easy, they asked for aid from the Government.

This aid, the delegates thought, might come in the shape of the Government building a breastwork in front of their property, and giving the city a grant towards the rest of the work in return for the advantage of easy access to the Battery. The Ministers did not see their way clear to construct the breastwork, however, but after getting an estimate of the cost of the whole structure from the delegates they promised a grant towards the project.

Mayor Dawson and Councillor Nicholson are to be congratulated upon the success which has attended their efforts in the interests of the citizens.

LATEST NEWS NOTES. Artificial ice rinks continue to be the rage in the best circles of London society. It is stated that King Alexander of Serbia is engaged in marriage to the eldest daughter of the King of Greece. A well-known London society paper expresses the opinion that the reign of the American beauty in London is over. General Booth, in an interview in London on Saturday said that he felt confident that Ballington Booth will return to the Salvation Army.

The Duke of York has quite taken his father's place in laying corner-stones, opening public institutions, presiding at hospital dinners, etc., and is a very busy man. A fifteen-year-old boy is under arrest in Jackson, Texas, charged with attempting to murder his father, his mother and the family physician by putting rough-on-rats in their coffee. A bill has been read a second time in the House of Lords empowering judges to order evidence which they think would be prejudicial to public morals not to be published. It has been arranged that the principal demonstration in connection with the centenary of the death of Burns will take place at Dumfries, where there will be a grand procession. Commander Ballington Booth has devised a new uniform for the revolved portion of the Salvation Army. The women will wear sky-blue material, with bonnets trimmed to match. The health of the Queen has so much improved that she has arranged to go to Coburg to attend the marriage of her granddaughter, Princess Alexandra to Prince Hohenzollern-Langenberg. It is felt in British military circles that Great Britain is not going to have a walk-over in Egypt. The Khediva has at his disposal about three hundred thousand men, of whom 40,000 are Bagdads, all trained and disciplined. General Macco, according to latest friendly reports, is destroying all the small inhabited places he passes through, and burning all the sugar and tobacco plantations. Cuba is in much need of being saved from her friends.

Owing to the snow blockade the conventions of the East Huron and North Renfrew Liberal Associations, which were to have been held on Saturday last, have been postponed, the former till April 3rd and the latter till next Saturday. It is generally believed in well-informed London political sets that England has secured the sanction of Germany, Austria and Italy to her Nile expedition, and that she is only burning her fingers in meddling with the Egyptian question. Mr. Arthur Balfour, the Conservative leader and First Lord of the Treasury, has shown that he is progressive and abreast of the spirit of the times, for he is now carrying his arm in a sling as the result of a fall from his bicycle. We know of no Canadian statesman who is so commendably up to date.

The northern squadron of the French fleet, instead of cruising near season off the coast of Spain, will sail about the British Channel and the Bay of Biscay. If this is the result of politics, it is safe to say that the sailors will condemn politics. Channel chops and Biscay gales are proverbial for unpleasantness, and the frequency with which they arise. A writer in the New York Freeman's Journal, a Roman Catholic periodical, severely criticises the policy of the bishops of New England regarding the appointment of parish priests, saying that they put Irish priests over French parishes and in many other ways discriminate against French priests. Criticism of such a kind is rarely allowed to appear in the Journal, and it is therefore probable that the writer represents the feeling of a large number of his co-religionists. Assimilation and the disease of the French language is probably the end that the prelates have in view.
