The Queen has created Prince Albert Victor, eldest son of the Prince of Wales, Duke of Clarence and Avondale and Earl of Athlone.

Miss Willard has sent to the Montreal Witness the following account of Miss Scovill, who is to give Bible readings here next week: "Miss Elizabeth J. Scovill is the daughter of a leading citizen of Nashville, Tenn. She gives remarkable Bible readings, and is a young evangelist of great mental vigor and spiritual powers. Born and reared in the South, she has her soft tones and warm heart, combined with the moral and intellectual strength that characterizes types of Northern womanhood. A capital horsewoman, and devoted to an outdoor life, she was accustomed to take her bible with her and to study in the great and lonely forests in her native State the three-fold revelation of heart within, nature around, and God in His inspired word. She started out to be an artist, and had a growing fame which would ere long have led her to Paris as a student. She established a pottery for artistic work in her native city, drew around her a large circle of students, became an adept in the testing of materials, owned valuable beds of clay and kaolin in different parts of the State, discovered a method of glazing so unique as to attract the attention of experts in New York city, and was on the road to a most successful career in her chosen pursuit. But a heavenly voice called her to leave all this and go forth, bible in hand, trusting only in the leadings of God's spirit as to where she should work and for the supply of all her needs. That an evangelist of so much power should have come to us from the South, is a fresh indication of the mighty movement among women in that section, of which current literature has already given so many proofs."

Justin McCarthy thus sizes up the leading men of the British Commons: "Physically, I am bound to admit that the Government men are the better looking. So far as looks are concerned, I should range the parties thus: Tories, Irish, Liberals, Liberal-Unionists. The two best looking men are, I think, George Windham and Sidney Herbert; the best looking Irishman is Mr. Parnell, and next to him are Arthur O'Connor and John O'Connor; the best looking Liberal is Herbert Garnier; the least ill-looking Liberal Unionist is Sir Henry James; the best looking man on the Government bench is Mr. Ritchie, and the best looking man on the front Opposition bench is Sir Charles Russell. The youngest looking man for his age (he is about 30) is Mr. Isaac Holden; and of the aged the handsomest man is the O'Grattan Mahon. The Speaker, in his wig and gown, is a remarkably handsome man. The best debater on the Government bench is Sir John Gorst, and next to him Mr. Balfour; the best on the front Opposition bench is (I exclude Mr. Gladstone) Sir William Harcourt, and the second best is, I think, H. Fowler. The best debater among the Irish is T. P. O'Connor. The best debater below the gangway on the Government side is Colonel Saunders, and the best below the Opposition gangway is Mr. Bradlaugh.

MURDER THE VERDICT.

St. John, May 27.

The Coroner's Jury this afternoon, after hearing the evidence in the Torry case, submitted the following verdict: "We the jury empanelled to enquire into the cause of the death of Samuel Torry find that the deceased came to his death from a wound by a knife in the hand of Theodore Watts, and that the said Theodore Watts did feloniously, wilfully and of his malice aforethought kill and murder the said Samuel Torry, and that William Gray was an accessory to the fact.

The Duke of Connaught in Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, Man., May 27.

The Duke of Connaught and party came into the city this morning from Sir Donald Smith's Cottage at Silver Heights and were met by the dignitaries of the city at the railway station. The Duke was presented with an address in the City Hall this afternoon, held a reception at Government House, inspected the hospital, drove around the city and at one o'clock p. m., took a special train for the East.

A Ten Thousand Dollar Scandal.

Montreal, May 27.

The great topic of the day following the Pacaud \$10,000 scandal is the attitude of the True Witness, the organ of the Irish Catholic population in the Province of Quebec. This paper, which has supported Mercier up to date, comes out to-day declaring that the National Leader is unworthy of future confidence, and asks the electors to turn the Government out on the 17th of June next.

Strike Settled.

Quincy, Mass., May 27.

The trouble among the granite cutters has been satisfactorily settled, and if it is pleasant to-morrow work will be resumed at all the quarries. The price list signed will not be broken without three months notice, and it is understood no objection will be raised to men working ten hours if they wish. The tenth hour is considered over time.

The Fisheries.

Ottawa, May 27.

Orders have been issued to have the Fisheries protection cruisers in readiness for service as soon as possible, and collectors of customs have been instructed to co-operate in affording information to the Fishery Intelligence Bureau which will be continued this season.

Stonecutters' Strike.

Barrie, Vt., May 27.

Contrary to expectations, no settlement was made with the sharpeners at the quarries and the granite cutters' union voted unanimously to sustain the sharpeners. To-day the granite cutters struck.

The Royal Society.

Ottawa, May 27.

The Royal Society continued its deliberations to-day and Professor Roberts of Windsor was elected to the vacancy in the English section.

Mr. Rykert will Resign.

Ottawa, May 27.

It is reported that Mr. Rykert intends resigning before the next session.

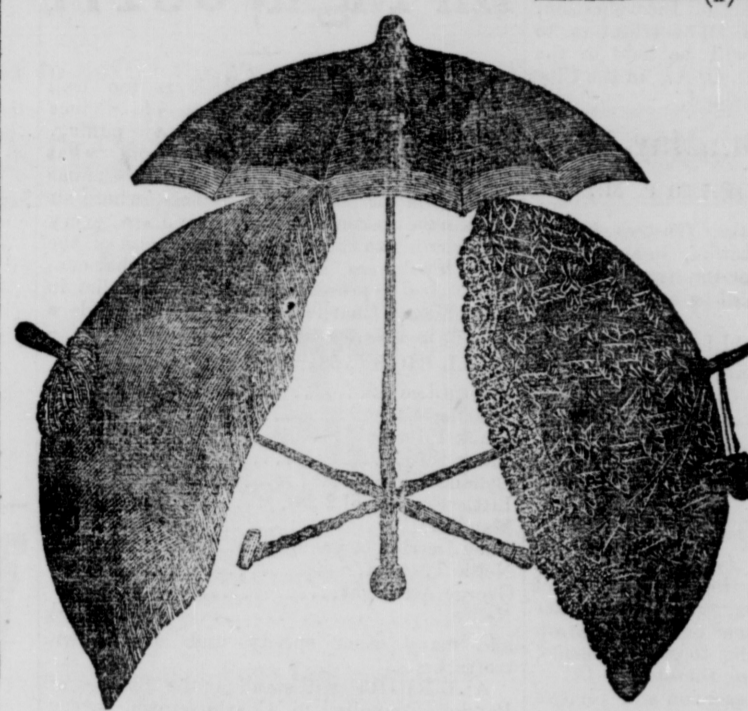
