IN MEMORIAM

MR. OSWALD GRAHAM
The residents of Cambridge and vicinity were filled with regret when it became known that on November 18, Mr. Oswald Graham, one of their oldest and most highly respected citizens had passed away in the P.E.I. Hospital after a lengthy illness.

Mr. Graham who was in his 79th year, was born November 25th, 1877. He was the son of the late Capt. John and Isabel (Millar) Graham.

About fifty-six years ago he was united in marriage with Annie Butler, also of Cambridge. To this union was born one son and a daughter. About fifteen years ago they were sadly bereaved, when during the second world war their son Everett, a member of the crew of the Otter, was drowned off Halifax, N.S. Mr. Graham also passed away seven years ago.

Mr. Graham who had been in poor health for a number of years, at different times spent several months in the P.E.I. Hospital returning home for short intervals. This last summer he was again forced to enter the hospital, where all that doctors, nurses and his friends could do for him was done, but to no avail. On the above date he passed away to be with his Saviour, whom he loved and served while here.

He was a consistent member, also an elder of the Peter's Road Presbyterian Church. News was kept at hand until forced by ill health to remain at home. He was also superintendent of the Sunday school for many years. After his wife's death he lived in the old home with his granddaughter and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Richards and family, where everything possible was done for his comfort.

The funeral which was largely attended was held from the Presbyterian Church, Peter's Road, November 20th. It was conducted by the minister, the Rev. M. Trans Mountain climbed 88 to a new high of 8113 with a turnover of nearly 3,000 shares. Base metals showed the best index climb, up more than a point but western oils were also strong with a point gain on their index. Central Explorers, although comparatively light on turnover, featured the western oil section. It jumped 90 cents to \$415. Other strong issues included Canadian Atlantic, Central Leduc and Decalta.

Personalities
In The News
By THE CANADIAN PRESS
Gamel Abdel Nasser was the world's foremost news personality in 1956. In a Canadian Press poll, telegraph editors of Canada's daily newspapers picked the Egyptian dictator by a wide margin over Sir Anthony Eden and President Eisenhower as the year's newsworthy individual. Topping selections for newsworthy Canadian was Lester B. Miles Pearson, the country's minister of external affairs. It was the sixth time in the last seven years that Mr. Pearson has been voted into the spot. Contenders in the Canadian section included Prime Minister St. Laurent, John Diefenbaker, George Drew, Gen. E. L. M. Burns and swimmer Marilyn Bell who won the honor two years ago.

127 Traffic Tickets Issued In Montreal
MONTREAL (CP)—Directors Hilaire Beaugreard said Wednesday provincial police issued 127 traffic tickets during the holiday weekend, from 5 p.m. Friday to Tuesday midnight. A partial breakdown showed nine cases of drivers with impaired faculties, one hit-and-run, four fatal accidents and 146 accidents in which damage was done. Director Beaugreard said he was happy to note that motorists generally appeared to drive with care and that none of the fatal accidents occurred on Christmas Day.

Vital Statistics For '55 Issued
OTTAWA (CP)—A total of 814,000 persons was added to Canada's population through natural increase in 1955, the highest number in history and the sixth highest rate of natural increase in the world. The bureau of statistics, issuing final vital statistics figures Thursday for 1955, said this record was due to record live births, maintenance of the low general mortality rate since 1950 and an all-time low in the infant mortality rate. The bureau, which issued preliminary figures last July, reported a total of 442,937 live births for a rate of 28.4 per 1,000 population, the third highest rate in the last 34 years and down only slightly from the 1954 rate of 28.7 and the post-war average of 28.9 in 1947. The 1955 death rate remained at the record 1954 low of 8.2 per 1,000 population, the fourth lowest death rate in the world. A record low infant mortality rate of 31 per 1,000 live births was established in 1955. The bureau remarked, however, that "infant mortality still remained a serious problem since it amounted to 11 per cent of all deaths in 1955 and the Canadian rate is higher than that in seven other countries." The 1955 marriage rate dipped to 8.2 per 1,000 from 8.5 in 1954, the lowest since the war and a continuation of the trend that started in 1951. The bureau said this trend was not seen as an indication that young people tended to postpone or avoid marriage. Rather it was more "a temporary drying up of the supply of potential brides and grooms" since the small number of depression babies now are just reaching marriageable age.
